**PENSHURST HISTORY – MAJOR MITCHELL & ABORIGINES****SOURCE: THE SYDNEY MORNING HERALD**

The land around Mt Rouse was once occupied by the Nareeb Nareeb and Kolor Aborigines who garnered plenty of food from the local environment and water from natural springs and creeks. The Kolor people took their name from the mountain which they called 'Collorrer'. They built substantial huts for their shelter in the winter, preferring the open countryside in the warmer months. Major Mitchell, who sighted Mount Rouse during his Australia Felix expedition of 1837, also encountered two of the aforementioned dwellings which he described as 'two very substantial huts'. On a rainy day he expressed a desire to 'return if possible, to pass the night there, for I began to learn that such huts, with a good fire between them, made comfortable quarters in bad weather.' From atop Mount Napier he noted: 'Smoke arose from many parts of the lower country, and showed that the inhabitants were very generally scattered over its surface. We could now look on such fires with indifference, so harmless were these natives, compared with those of the Darling, and the smoke, now ascended in equal abundance from the furthest verge of the horizon.'

Each tribe had a chief who consulted with the other elders. Those regarded as having special contact with the spirit world practiced healing and were held in some awe. Tunrap Warneen, chief of the Kolor tribe, was one such healer whose reputation drew Aborigines from far afield. He spoke many dialects and, at corroborees and meetings, his face was rendered in red pigment with white lines beneath the eyes. A band around his temple bore the feather of a turkey bustard or the crest of a white cockatoo. His fate was indicative of early black-white relations in that he was shot by the manager of a station near Mount Kolor, causing a tremendous sense of grief and loss to the neighbouring tribes.

As many as 20 tribes would attend meetings at a large marsh to the south-east of Peshurst in order to barter, feast, hunt and socialise. Intricate laws governing sexual relations were designed to prevent interbreeding. A local squatter remarked: 'The aborigines are everywhere divided into classes, and everyone is considered to belong to his mother's class, and cannot marry into it in any tribe, as all of the same class are considered brothers and sisters.'

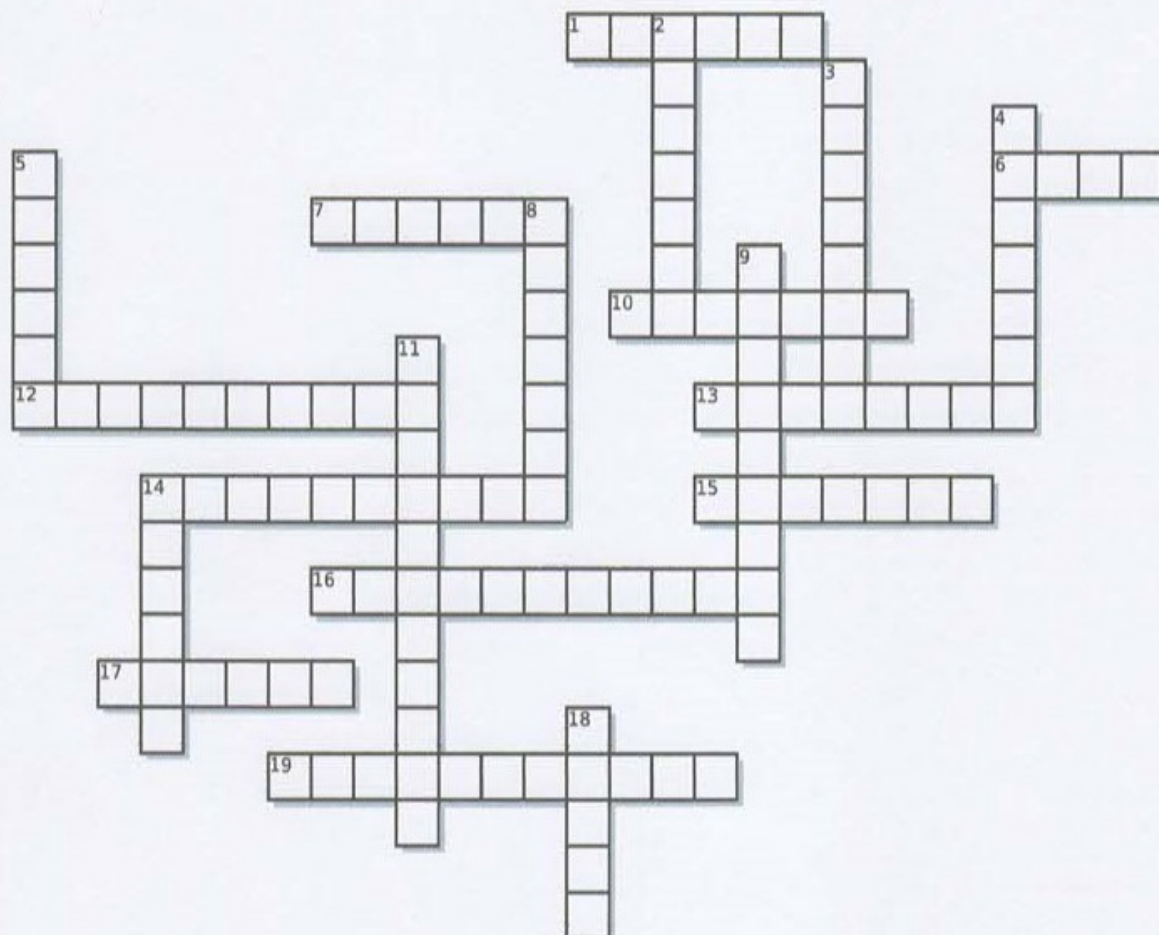

## A PAGE TO SHARE RECIPES

The following recipes were submitted by readers this week.

### Pork Chops in Apple Juice

Remove the rind and fat from enough large, leg pork chops to give you 700g after the trimming . Arrange in a shallow baking dish, fitting closely, but not overlapping.

Crush: 1 large clove garlic directly onto chops.

Mix: 200 ml apple juice.

25 ml soy sauce.

6 fresh sage leaves, finely chopped.

Pour over chops.

The liquid should just cover the chops. Leave for 2-3 hours and then cover and bake on middle shelf at 165°C or 325°F for at least 1 hour and 15 mins. By this time they should be well cooked and the liquid should be reduced to about 125 ml.

Remove chops and arrange on warm platter. Don't salt, as you have enough salt in the soy sauce.

Pour the pan drippings into a pot and thicken with 12,5 ml cornflour mixed with 50 ml white wine. Allow to boil up and, while stirring, add 2 ml sugar and 25 ml thin cream. Pour over chops and serve with vegetables of your choice.

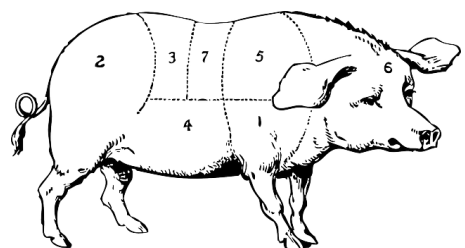
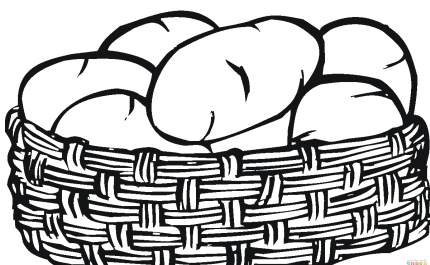
### Stuffed Jacket Potatoes

Bake 6 potatoes in a moderate oven until cooked. Cut potatoes in half and scoop out flesh, carefully making sure that you don't tear the skin.

Sometimes it is better to leave a few centimeters of flesh behind, all the way round.

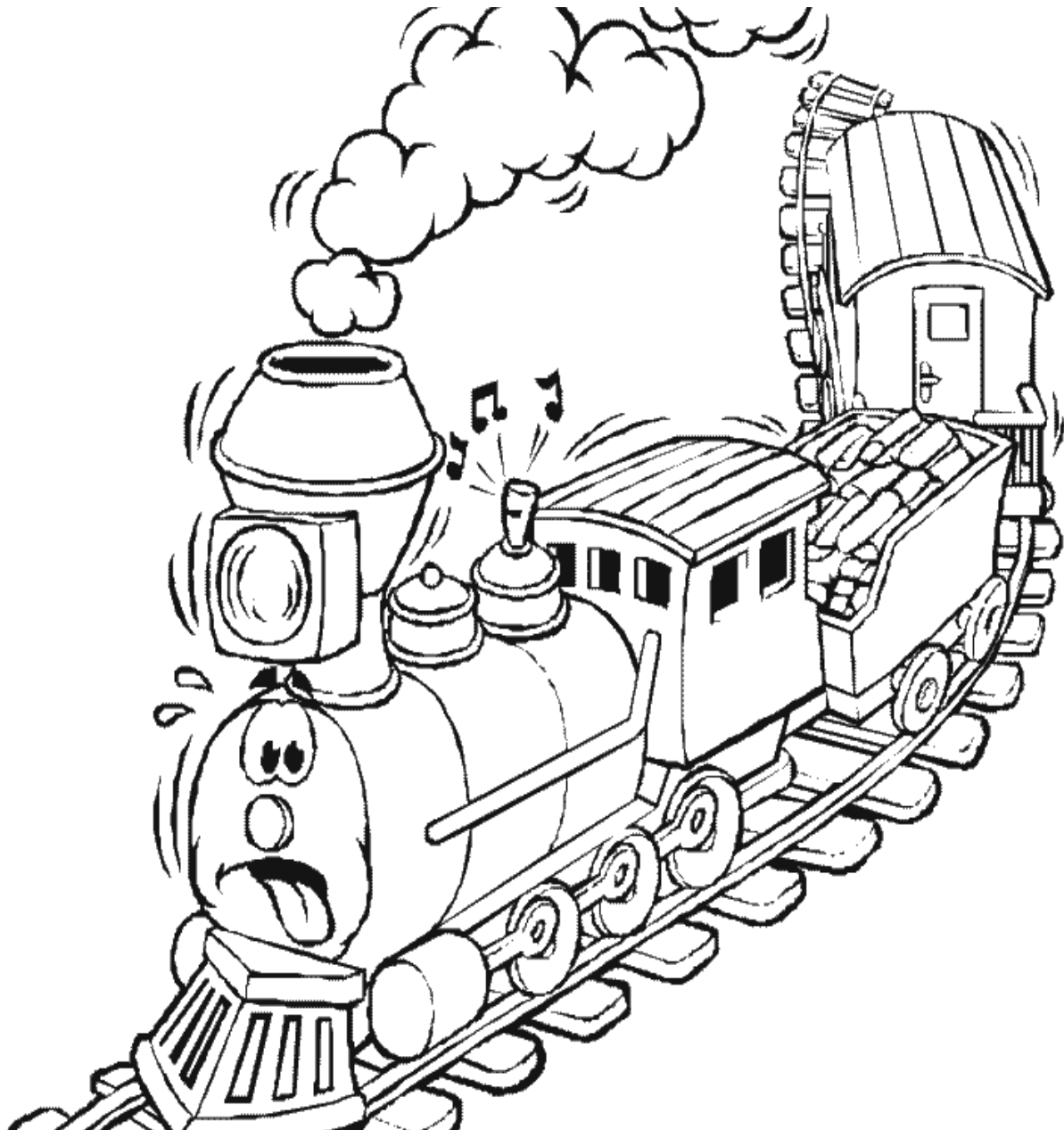
Place flesh in bowl. Mash with about a cup of cheddar cheese. At this stage you can add sliced leeks, or chopped onions, chives, parsley etc. Season well, and carefully place mixture back into potato casing.

Sprinkle with extra cheese and some cooked bacon pieces and bake for 15 minutes more, until cheese has melted.

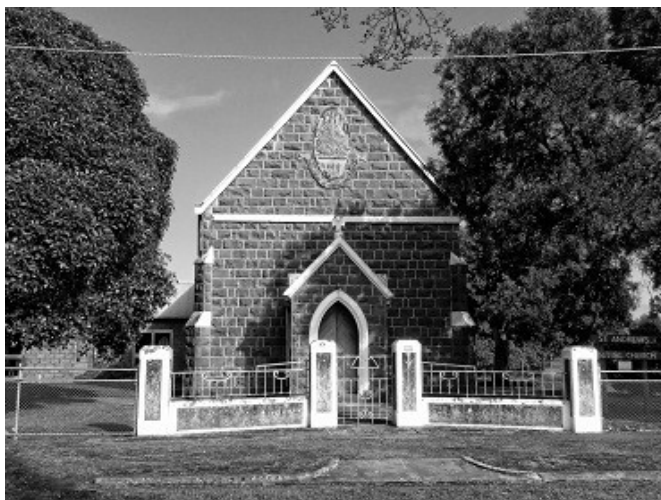

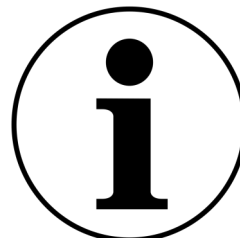

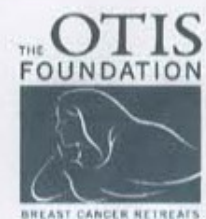

### Looking after our wildlife

Spring is here and while farmers minds are on the fields, those of us in town have other things to consider.

About a week ago my husband was mowing the neighbour's lawn when he came across a circular bare patch in the grass near a small tree. On investigation a young Barn Owl decided he was a distinct threat and attempted to run away, with magnificent displays of how large he was, and how strong. In the meantime the maggots were getting ready to attack again, which might explain why he was there, or some other injury kept him grounded for a number of days. We rang the Hamilton Wildlife Shelter and delivered him to them, where we learned that he was exhausted, thin and starving.



In the six plus years we have lived in town we have had an echidna in our front yard, who let me take his photos, a mother koala who camped by our water bowl (she also ended visiting the Shelter too, though she did not recover. We are told that kidney problems are not uncommon in the species), and we've seen wallabies bouncing down the street. I won't mention the snakes.
