Schools Change	 Remote learning state-wide, including Year 11 and 12s, except for vulnerable children and children of permitted workers (from Wednesday, 5 August) Specialist schools remain open for all children. Childcare and kinder remain open for all children.
Sporting activities Change	 Community sport: closed Indoor sport and recreation: closed Out sport: only allowed to exercise, or activities such as fishing golf, boating, tennis, surfing with one other person or household members, provided 1.5 metre distance can be maintained. FACEMASKS AVAILABLE FOR VULNERABLE COMMUNITY MEMBERS

Southern Grampians Shire Council has received a supply of disposable masks for distribution to our most vulnerable community members, thanks to the State Government.

Community members who meet the eligibility will be entitled to receive two disposable masks and can leave their details with Council to be issued a reusable mask, when they become available.

Community members who are eligible are:

- People over the age of 12 years who are actively managing the following conditions:
 - Poor immunity
 - o Heart disease, diabetes and stroke
 - o Obesity
 - Chronic lung disease
 - Alcohol and drug dependency frailty
- People living in public housing, in crisis accommodation, or who are homeless
- · People living in rooming houses and supported residential services
- People living with a disability
- People with other needs including alcohol and drug issues
- People experiencing mental health concern
- People experiencing family violence
- · Young people in residential facilities, and those receiving other health and human services
- Young people with health and/or social issues that make them vulnerable
- Young people living in mandatory facilities
- · Aboriginal people
- Refugee and asylum seekers

People who meet these eligibility criteria and who have been unable to source a facemask for themselves, are welcome to come into Council's Brown Street Customer Service Centre to obtain a disposable facemask allocation or phone 5573 0444 to discuss your needs with our Customer Service Team.

Council will also be distributing these masks to all eligible community members through its Home and Community Care Program so those clients who currently receive these services do not need to come into collect a mask.

Information about how to correctly wear and dispose of masks will also be available to customers.

Good afternoon everyone,

Please allow me to have a small rant before settling into more serious matters, such as the various grants the town is applying for to improve Penshurst. Why the town? It might be my name, or someone else's, on the grant application, but quite often what we choose to reach for is for the benefit of all .. And so on with the rant ...

Can we of Victoria all behave ourselves well enough to get out of the lockdown in mid September, or are we going to be here forever just because it annoys some people to think their freedom to infect other people, with viruses, or very strange ideas, has been taken away from them by the Government - instead of seeing this period of time as a gift we give each other to set all of us free? Our choice to obey the rules would have meant we didn't need this second lockdown, but no! It's too hard for some. I apologise to all the health workers who have been working their butts off trying to save the lives of the innocent and the quilty, and the blind, insensitive stupid individuals who had to go out, even when they 'only thought it was a sniffle'. A 30 year old man died a few days ago, not to mentioned the 100's of others, many of them elderly, who did nothing to harm anyone else. The Progress Association has also applied to the Council for a grant for a Santa Sleigh to decorate the fluffy (furry) tree they provide, that stood near the entrance to the Botanic Gardens last year. We will also be applying for sails in the Gardens, for the summer, to cover at least part of the kid's climbing frame.

The Hall Committee of Management is applying to the Government for solar panels. Anything that cuts down on the cost of electricity, mostly for the public toilets attached to the building, has to be good. So there is stuff going on behind the scenes, even during the lockdown. Be safe, Ama Cooke

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In My Garden with Janet Shalders

Unusual Pests in the Garden. I had planted a young tree which was actually not much more than a stick, when the pup we had at the time chewed at it destroying the new plant. On another occasion, I had put some stick like cuttings in the garden bed and saw a magpie fly off with them for its nest.

Ducks are supposed to be good in the garden getting rid of snails, snugs and other creepie crawlies. Unfortunately, the snails were well hidden under plants and stones so the ducks didn't find them. I had wondered why self-sown seeds were not coming up in the garden and after I no longer had ducks, realized the ducks were eating them as they germinated. The ducks learnt to fly over the vegie garden fence and ate the tomatoes, that's when I gave them away.

Chooks got into the garden and ate the newly planted tomato seedlings. Chooks are great in an orchard scratching under the trees eating various pests. Their manure is also good for the trees. They will cause havoc in the garden scratching and making dust bowls amongst the plants. I had wondered why vegie seeds were not germinating well but when covered with a mesh, came up well.



The birds were scratching in the ground which disrupted the germination. Having realized that was happening with pea seeds, I covered them until the plants were about 6 inches high, uncovered the young plants to have them stripped of the leaves by birds.

Very unusual pests are wallabies. They left their calling card after having a go at the well grown peas after having hopped past other vegies. I was blaming possums for eating the broccoli until I saw the wallabies' calling card. Now I make sure I shut the gate into the vegie garden.

The best way to prevent animals or birds from destroying precious vegies or fruit is to cover with mesh or netting. I have seen a small orchard, vegie garden, covered with a large framed, netting cage to provide protection from animals and birds. My vegie garden has a good size fence around it with a gate into the garden area.

Despite the pests, I still enjoy the garden.



- a notch at the bottom to show which way to insert the card into an ATM or EFTPOS terminal.








18. The Old Manse The stone
Presbyterian Manse was built in 1867 at
a cost of £650. It was re-roofed and
renovated during the period from1955
to 1959. It has since become a private
residence and has had more recent
renovations completed.

19. St Andrew's Uniting Church. Built of bluestone quarried in Burchett Street this was originally the Presbyterian Church. It was opened on 30th April 1865 and provided seating for 200 worshippers. The building was re-roofed in the 1950s. In 1959-60 new seating was provided by John Clarke in memory of his wife Beatrice (nee Eales), who served the church for many years as a teacher, organist and choir leader.






20. All Saints Anglican Church

The land was gazetted to the Church of England in 1869; however the church was not built until 1898. It is a simple weatherboard building with a porch at the front, a vestry to the side and a polygonal apse at the rear.

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Another winter warmer which will become a favourite

Crisp-fried Cheese Ravioli

Prep time 15 mins - Cooking Time 15 mins

INGREDIENTS - 4 Servings

1 cup (250ml) buttermilk 2 cups breadcrumbs 500g packet good-quality cheese ravioli Sunflower oil, to deep-fry

300ml good-quality tomato pasta sauce Parsley and grated parmesan, to serve

METHOD

Step 1 Place buttermilk and breadcrumbs in separate bowls. Dip each ravioli first in buttermilk, then in crumbs to coat.

Step 2 Half-fill a deep-fryer or large saucepan with oil and heat to 190°C (the oil is hot enough when a cube of bread turns golden in 30 seconds). Working in batches of 5, fry ravioli for 1-2

minutes until crumbs are golden and crispy. Remove with a slotted spoon and drain on paper towel.

Step 3 Meanwhile, heat sauce in a small pan over low heat to warm through. Season, then transfer to a bowl. Sprinkle with fresh parsley.

Step 4 Arrange ravioli on a platter, sprinkle with parsley and parmesan, then serve with the sauce for dipping.

Around the Churches

250 words from Fr David

Most of my best words are pinched or inspired by someone else. The phrase "Self discipline for the good of everyone else" is an excellent example. I have shamelessly filched it from another source.

It's tempting to think that self discipline is a new thing that was just popped in yesterday, but actually self discipline has been around ever since Adam and Eve were tempted to eat that yummy, succulent fruit.

But we are particularly aware of the need for self discipline at this time and in this place. The stakes are so much higher now. In fact, quality of life and life itself, are the highest possible currency.

Self discipline requires something of us. There is a cost to be paid and we make this payment for someone else, not for ourselves. It is an outward looking gesture and the focus is on someone other than little ol' me.

It's good news, not just for the feel good factor. Not just because we might feel smug. It is great news because we realise that it isn't always about me; my wants, my needs, my rights. It shouldn't always have to be about me.

And its not just about the self discipline, sanitiser, face masks, testing and 1.5 metres. The other 50% of the question is what is going to be best for the most vulnerable and the voiceless. And what is going to be most helpful for those who relentlessly, sacrificially tend them.

I come back to the Master pinned to cross, who in the ultimate act of self discipline, exclaims silently but unequivocally, it's about the other. The I crossed out. So in this time of tumult we set the bar just a smidge higher, take a deep breath ... run like heck and jump. "Self discipline for the good others". What a great turn of phrase. I wish I had thought of it.




