Caramut and District Garden Club

Stinging Nettles: I can hear you saying, "What is there to write about such awful weeds?" They sting like crazy when you brush against them and often cause red spots to appear. It is actually the hairs on the leaves or stems which act like hypodermic needles which inject the chemicals which produce the stinging sensation. They grow from seed or can be grown by cuttings. Stinging Nettles have a long history of use as a source of traditional medicine, food, tea and textile raw materials.



If you have stinging nettles growing in your garden, it is a sign of high fertility. Where the nettles grow in abundance under apple trees, the apples taste the best. The nettles are a wonderful additive to the compost where they speed up the decomposition process. Because they are deep rooted, they bring up nutrients from the soil which benefit the plants you wish to grow. They can also be harvested (I would suggest before they seed) and used as a mulch in the vegie garden as they will provide nitrogen and potassium for the vegies. They can also be used o make a weed tea from them. Soak the plants in a bucket of water for a week or more. The brew can be used for the compost or diluted to the colour of week tea to use on the garden. Plants will love it.



November 12th, the Garden Club will be having a bus trip to Portland to visit 3 gardens. Cost is \$20 for members and **visitors are most welcome** - \$30.

Our next meeting is at the Caramut Recreation Ground at 10 am. Our guest will be demonstrating the making of a "Wall garden." The special bloom for the month is a Dutch Iris.

The following recipe is tasty and fresh for Spring

Herb Crusted Pork Cutlets with Veggie Medley

Serves 4 Prep: 20 Mins (plus 10 mins chilling) Cooking 15 mins

INGREDIENTS

HERB CRUSTED CUTLETS

40 g (¼ cup) plain flour

4 pork cutlets, trimmed and battered out to 1 cm thickness

2 eggs, beaten

3 cups breadcrumbs

2 tablespoons chopped rosemary 20 g (1 tablespoon) Spreadable Soft butter 60 ml (¼ cup) vegetable oil

VEGGIE MEDLEY

60 g (about ¼ cup) Spreadable Soft Butter

2 garlic cloves, crushed

1 large zucchini, halved and thinly sliced

2 bunches broccolini, trimmed

1 x 200 g punnet cherry or grape tomatoes

METHOD

HERB CRUSTED CUTLETS

Step 1 Place the flour in a large shallow bowl. Season with salt and pepper. Place the beaten egg in another shallow bowl and the crumbs with rosemary in a third shallow bowl

Step 2 Press the cutlets in the seasoned flour, dip in the egg wash and press into the rosemary crumbs to completely coat. Transfer coated cutlets to a plate or small tray lined with baking paper. Place in the fridge for 10-15 minutes, if time permits (this helps the crumb to stick to the cutlets while cooking).

Step 3 Preheat the oven to 180°C/200°C fan forced. Heat the Spreadable and oil in a large ovenproof frying pan or flameproof baking tray over medium to high heat. Add the cutlets and shallow-fry for 2 minutes each side or until golden brown.

Transfer to a plate lined with paper towel and keep warm.

VEGGIE MEDLEY

Heat the extra spreadable with the garlic in the same cleaned pan or tray over medium heat. Add the zucchini, broccolini and tomatoes. Season to taste. Return the cutlets to the pan or tray, then transfer to the oven and cook for about 10 minutes or until cutlets are cooked through and vegetables are golden.

Verreaux's sifaka (Propithecus verreauxi), or the white sifaka, is a medium-sized primate in one of the lemur families, the Indriidae. It lives in Madagascar and can be found in a variety of habitats from rainforest to western Madagascar dry deciduous forests and dry and spiny forests. Its fur is thick and silky and generally white with brown on the sides, top of the head, and on the arms. Like all sifakas, it has a long tail that it uses as a balance when leaping from tree to tree. However, its body is so highly adapted to an arboreal existence, on the ground its only means of locomotion is hopping. The species lives in small troops which forage for food.


The Penshurst Courthouse - Recent History

The courthouse served the town for almost 100 years, the last case being heard in 1970. From the early 1970's the building was used informally by the Historical society. The courthouse contains the original 'court' furniture. The magistrate's room and the clerk's room are now used as research rooms for the use of members and the general public. The original decision of the relevant authorities was to strip the courthouse of its furnishings. The Society's members at the time, hearing of this plan, blockaded the courthouse and refused to let the workman enter and remove these historically valuable furnishings. The members won out in the end and we now have one of the few fully furnished courthouses in Victoria.

In 2007 the Department of Sustainability and Environment formally handed over the building to the Historical Society as trustees of this heritage listed building. It is now the official home of the Historical Society. The Society collects, catalogues, files and maintains historical records, maps and photographs and makes them available for public access. With the assistance of various grants the interior of the building has been painted and other maintenance work carried out to assist in the preservation of the building. In 2008 the Victorian Police Department donated the old police lock up to the Historical Society and it was moved from its old location, behind the police residence to its new home at the rear of the courthouse.
