## Chipotle pulled pork with black bean rice

Prep Time 15 mins - Cooking Time 2 hr 15 mins

## INGREDIENTS - 4 servings

1 1/2 tbsp olive oil	400 g can black beans, drained, rinsed
500g pork shoulder, halved length-ways	125 g can corn kernels, drained
3 cups vegetable stock	2 tbsp sliced pickled jalapenos
1 1/2 tbsp of chipotle chillies finely chopped	1/2 cup grated tasty cheese
1 dried bay leaf	1 tomato finely diced
1 brown onion finely chopped	Fresh coriander sprigs to serve
1 cup white rice	Baby cos leaves to serve
	Lime wedges to serve

## METHOD

**Step 1** Heat 2 teaspoons oil in a 7cm-deep, 24cm round (base) shallow flameproof baking dish over medium-high heat. Season pork with salt and pepper. Add to pan. Cook for 2 minutes each side or until browned. Add stock, chipotle and bay leaf. Bring to the boil. Reduce heat to medium-low. Cover. Cook for 1 hour 30 minutes.



**Step 2** Carefully transfer pork to a plate. Transfer liquid to a large heatproof jug. Discard bay leaf. Using 2 forks, shred pork.

**Step 3** Heat remaining oil in baking dish over medium-high heat. Add onion. Cook, stirring, for 4 minutes or until golden. Add rice. Stir until well coated in oil. Add beans, corn, pork and 1 3/4 cups cooking liquid. Stir to combine. Bring to the boil. Reduce heat to medium. Cover. Cook for 15 minutes (do not remove lid before end of cooking time). Stand for 2 minutes.

**Step 4** Preheat grill on high. Remove lid. Top pork with jalapeños and cheese. Grill for 3 to 4 minutes or until cheese melts. Sprinkle with tomato and coriander. Serve with baby cos leaves and lime wedges.



## Continuing with the history of our town and Region

With thanks to the author, Philip Doherty, of the Mt Rouse and District Historical Society for providing this article. We hope the many new residents to Penshurst enjoy learning about their adopted town's history.

### PENSHURST RECREATION RESERVE HISTORY

(continued from last newsletter)

In 1905 the trustees sent a letter to the cricket, gun and football clubs asking for twenty shillings each for the use of the rec reserve. These funds helped pay for the erection of a water closet (WC) and urinal. One wonders what spectators used before this.

In October 1909 the trustees put out a Tender for a post and rail fence to be erected around the oval – the final cost was twenty-one pound. The fence was erected just in time for the Pastoral and Agricultural Society to hold their first show, on Friday the 26<sup>th</sup> November, which became an annual event.

In the same year W. A. Kelly took over the grazing rights from Mr. A. Baulch and the cricket club undertook some improvements.

By 1915 a Terrier Coursing Club, which used live buck rabbits as the lure, was also using the reserve. They erected netting around the boundary and a good terrier made a couple of kills in an afternoon. In the same year the football club was asked for a donation to assist in the maintenance of the reserve.



Improvements in 1919 included having the well cleaned out and the sides stoned. The following year the Agricultural Society was asked to pay a fee (for the first time) and all clubs were asked to pay toward the upkeep of the facilities.

In 1921 the football club was charged ten shillings per match and now that all clubs were being charged fees for the use of the reserve the trustees had an ongoing battle to collect the money.

At the June 1926 meeting the trustees received a letter from the football club asking for permission to use the ground – this was granted at the fee of two pound – and one pound for the previous years use. The trustee secretary was also instructed to approach the football club for the outstanding 1924 fee! Additionally the secretary was asked to approach the Croxton East Football Club for their 1924 fee and the show committee for their 1925 fee.

Early in 1927 the football club and Ag. Society had paid up but nothing was heard from Mr. Huf, secretary of Croxton East Football Club. With compound interest it might be worth the present day trustees to chase up the eighty-seven year old debt from the Croxton East club.



Also in 1927 the trustees met with delegates from the football club and Ag. Society to consider improvements to the reserve. They agreed to move the WC and urinal from the cattle yards site to the North West corner of the reserve; buy and pipe water from the railway yards and remove stones and fill in well.

By now the football club was being charged ten shillings sixpence for matches where a charge for entrance was made and W. A. Kelly was paying eight pounds for the grazing rights. An Athletic Club was also using the reserve.

At the February 1928 meeting the Trustees settled on buying water from the railways at two shillings and sixpence per one thousand gallons. In addition they paid one pound one shilling in license fees a year, against the cost of one hundred and nine pounds for a windmill and bore.

Two tenders were received for the laying of the gal pipe from the railway tank to the reserve – a distance of nine chains. Messer's McNiece and Hatherall tendered thirty-one pound eighteen shillings; but S Cottrill's tender of twenty-five pound eighteen shillings was accepted.



### Wisdom and Aging

The turning of the leaves has reminded me of a good friend Basil. He lived a long time ago in a different place. Whenever I went to see him I knew I was in for a scintillating conversation, peppered with laughter, wisdom and insights. There was also the gift of silence when we said nothing and let the silence say it for us.

From his nursing home room Basil could see a fountain, a bit of courtyard, some lawn, and a stunning claret ash tree. I remember vividly going one autumn day to see him. The wind had that decided edge to it, the sky was crystal blue and the leaves had turned that spectacular deep, sumptuous red. For a while we chattered away and, on this day, Basil's insights were a prickly balm that made you stand on your head and take notice. The irony was that Basil wasn't as sharp as he used to be. The years had worn his body down and the words took a little while to tumble out, but when they did ... They were valuable words.

I marvelled at what he said. The sort of wisdom that only someone who is senior in years could offer. Basil was someone who could look back with hindsight and see the big picture, a view from the hill if you like.

For an indeterminate amount of time, we just looked in silence at the miracle of nature in the claret ash tree. The space in our conversation was filled with unspeakable light.

I came away humbled and blessed by the encounter. I could not help thinking how marvellous it was that in the autumn of his life, Basil was in some ways, his most magnificent. As I approach my autumnal time, my hope is that I too might become another 'Basil'.



## A Page for the Children to enjoy

Pure water is tasteless, odorless, and colourless. Water can occur in three states: **solid** (ice), **liquid**, or **gas** (vapor).

**Solid water**—ice is frozen water. When water freezes, its molecules move farther apart, making ice less dense than water. This means that ice will be lighter than the same volume of water, and so ice will float in water. Water freezes at 0° Celsius, 32° Fahrenheit.



**Liquid water** is wet and fluid. This is the form of water with which we are most familiar. We use liquid water in many ways, including washing and drinking.

**Water as a gas**—vapor is always present in the air around us. You cannot see it. When you boil water, the water changes from a liquid to a gas or water vapor. As some of the water vapor cools, we see it as a small cloud called steam. This cloud of steam is a mini version of the clouds we see in the sky. At sea level, steam is formed at 100° Celsius, 212° Fahrenheit.

The water vapor attaches to small bits of dust in the air. It forms raindrops in warm temperatures. In cold temperatures, it freezes and forms snow or hail.

### The Water Cycle

The **water cycle** or **hydrologic** is a continuous cycle where water evaporates, travels into the air and becomes part of a cloud, falls down to earth as precipitation, and then evaporates again. This repeats again and again in a never-ending cycle. Water keeps moving and changing from a solid to a liquid to a gas, over and over again.

**Precipitation** creates **runoff** that travels over the ground surface and helps to fill lakes and rivers. It also **percolates** or moves downward through openings in the soil to replenish **aquifers** under the ground. Some places receive more **precipitation** than others do. These areas are usually close to oceans or large bodies of water that allow more water to **evaporate** and form clouds. Other areas receive less **precipitation**. Often these areas are far from water or near mountains. As clouds move up and over mountains, the water vapor condenses to form precipitation and freezes. Snow falls on the peaks.

Water on earth today has been here for millions of years. Because of the **water cycle**, water moves from the earth to the air to the earth again. It changes from solid to liquid to gas, over and over again.



The first kid leans over and asks, "What are you in here for?"


The second kid says, "I'm in here to get my tonsils out, and I'm a little nervous."
