WW2 Soldier Settler Historical Markers

Over forty soldier settler descendants and friends gathered on Sunday 24 April to unveil two historical markers covering the Gerrigerrup, Stonefield, Youngs and Moyne Falls soldier settlement estates.

Peter Guthrie and Ron Jelbart unveiled the Gerrigerrup marker while Mrs Gwen Farley-Smith and Mary Johnson unveiled the Minhamite marker. The attendees were delighted to see Gwen and daughter Robyn at the unveiling, and during the post unveiling BBQ Gwen recalled her times with husband Bill farming and raising a family on the Stonefield Estate.

The historical marker idea gained momentum after the 2021 launch of James Affleck's book *From Tents and Tin Huts – to Timber Houses and Tiger Snakes,* a compilation of WW2 soldier settler family stories.

Good afternoon, or in this case, late evening, I hope you are having a good day.

No ghost stories were written this fortnight, but a great deal of paperwork was caught up on, issues discussed, decisions made and changes put in place. One of the things that did happen was my aunt's birthday, better known to most people as Anzac Day. The lack of a service has been a discussion around the town, and I think brought to people's attention the importance of that Ceremony, even if you have never attended one here in town before. It is a short time, in many a busy schedule, to remember those we have loved and lost, particularly through wars, by whatever name they have been labelled .. and makes us more aware of events happening around the world that would be terrifying if they arrived at our front door. Australia is a very lucky country, and we tend to forget that when something doesn't go our way. So right now I would like to thank everyone who served their country, in war or peace, and to take a moment to remember those we lost. I hope that there will be a 'next year', that isn't lived within the pollution of nuclear fallout, or emotional fall out created by events we have no control over, when we can have total control over what we say to each other, and how we treat each other on a day to day basis for the rest of the year.

This month has been a learning curve for me. I signed up to become one of the Community Panel at Wannon Water, to look at the company from the inside out, and we did. There were seven of us, from different walks of life across the western district, who had two full day inperson meetings, and a other forms of literature. During that time we learned a whole lot about the company and their attitude to

their role in the communities they support. I also was given the opportunities to discuss the upcoming sewerage installation here in town, part one of which will cost \$1.2 million of the total installation they believe will be \$16 million. Strangely, in this day and age, the figures do not appear staggering to me, but I did warn them to expect a lot of rock and a higher cost for the project, and they say they are prepared for it, so that should be interesting to watch. It was wonderful to see how focused the employees of the company are on taking care of their customers, and not pricing us out of existence every quarter with their bills. If you ever have a problem with a water account, get in contact with them. We sprung a leak under this house once, giving us a bill that was ten times its normal cost, without us noticing, and they really were great people to deal with. I also took the opportunity to ask for a wider range of grants for our communities ..

And progress in our process ... you might have noticed a few small changes in the street. The tables have gone from the front of the VDC. The Heritage Walks board might be gone by now. The Lion's Shelter will be coming down very soon and a new building will be created in its place, provided by the Council. Each small change is part of a wider plan to revitalise the face of the town and make it more appealing to travellers, as well as more liveable for all of us. To find out more about the projects, and suggest your own, come to a meeting, stop and say hi and ask questions, phone me, or offer to lend a hand. Many hands make light work, as my mother often reminds me.





Your local Penshurst Ambulance Community Officer (ACO) members attended a wonderful Easter market held at the Kolor property on Easter Saturday! It was a gorgeous sunny day that attracted many local and new faces into our little country town.

We attended the Easter market looking for new recruits to help cover our area and provide assistance to any that need it! Ambulance team members have to volunteer a minimum of 20 hours a month and receive paid and supportive training throughout their time as a volunteer, with no medical background required!



The Penshurst team currently have only 3 ACOs on road and we are struggling to maintain, let alone increase our coverage above 50% for our area. To have a viable ambulance service in Penshurst we desperately need more people to step up and help. Having so few ACOs is not viable long term. We seriously need people living in the Penshurst and local area to consider putting up their hand to help, so that we can keep this important service available. With our closest paramedics located in Hamilton it would be great to offer more support to all of the locals.

Caramut and District Garden Club

From now on there is usually a lot of tidying up to do in the garden this month as summer or autumn grown plants and vegies die off. Garden rubbish left lying about harbours pests or diseases but make good composting materials.

Hopefully the tree dahlias will flower before frost cuts them back. To propagate tree dahlias, cut the sappy stems at a node and plant upright in the ground. The plant will rot if the soil becomes water logged for long periods. Tree dahlias will remain in the one place for many years and require minimal watering once well established. If they tend to grow too tall, they will fall over but they can be cut back to fence height and will still flower.

Broad beans can be planted now and prefer to grow right through the colder months. They are good plants for replenishing nitrogen in the soil or can even be used as green manure crops to improve impoverished soils. As broad beans tend to be taller growing, support will be required to stop them toppling over. The young finger sized pods can be cooked and eaten whole. Broad beans are hungry for potassium and phosphorus, so a complete fertiliser for both elements will be needed in most soils although I have good results without adding these.





A PAGE TO SHARE RECIPES

Hearty Chicken Soup

Prep Time 20 mins Cooking Time 35 mins Serves 6

INGREDIENTS

1 tablespoon avocado oil or olive oil

6 cloves of garlic, minced

1 yellow onion, diced

2 large carrots, thinly sliced

2 celery stalks, roughly chopped

1 tablespoon fresh grated ginger

1 tablespoon fresh grated turmeric (or 1

teaspoon ground turmeric)

6 cups chicken broth (low salt)

500g boneless skinless chicken breast or thighs

1 teaspoon freshly chopped rosemary

1 teaspoon freshly chopped thyme, stems removed

½ teaspoon salt

Freshly ground black pepper 1 cup pearl or Israeli couscous 2/3 cup frozen peas (optional, but

recommended)

METHOD

Place a large pot over medium high heat and add in oil. Once oil is hot, add in garlic, onion, carrots and celery; cook for a few minutes until onion becomes translucent.

Next add in grated ginger and grated turmeric. Sauté for 30 seconds to let the spices cook a bit, then add in chicken broth, chicken breast, rosemary, thyme, salt and pepper.

Bring soup to a boil, then stir in couscous. You'll want the chicken to be covered by the broth so make sure you stir them down to the bottom.



Reduce heat to medium low and simmer uncovered for 20 - 25 minutes or until chicken is fully cooked.

Once chicken is cooked, remove with a slotted spoon and transfer to a cutting board to shred with two forks. Add chicken back to pot then stir in frozen peas. If you find that you don't have enough broth, feel free to add in another cup. Everyone likes their soup differently. Taste and adjust seasonings, if necessary. Enjoy.



Penshurst Portraits - Timelines

Continuing our exploration of the Penshurst Timeline from the History Society's book, "Penshurst Portraits: A Brief History of the Penshurst District", from last fortnight. We have touched 1852 when the first town blocks were sold.

1952 - Friedrich Johann
Krumnow purchased 1584
acres of crown land (formerly
Aboriginal Protectorate land)
at Tabor and established the
Herrnhut Commune. Based
loosely on principles of the
Moravian Brethren, it survived

for nine years after his death in 1880.

- ca. 1852 Mail service to the Penshurst areas was covered by the weekly Hexham to Hamilton run, initially by Saunders' Mail Coaches and later by Cobb & Co.
- 1858 Two bluestone rooms served as a National School at 83 Bell Street, in part of the Chesswas' home. The National School opened on Dec. 20th. It is debatable whether this or the State School was the first in Penshurst.
- 1858 Penshurst State School (No. 486) was built. A qualified ships master, PD Baxter, was the first teacher and there were 34 pupils. Closed when new Primary School opened on Warrnambool Road in 1963.
- 1859 The Shearer's Arms hotel, and the Mt Rouse Inn on the Hamilton-Penshurst Rd at Boram Boram, opened the first pubs in Penshurst and District. The Shearer's Arms was burnt down in May, 1860 and rebuilt, but Aaron Lane's application for a new licence the same year was struck out and it never re-opened. The Mt Rouse Inn, operated by John Earls, closed in 1867.
- 1860 Mount Rouse Road District proclaimed on 24th September.
- 1860 Wesleyan (Methodist) Church built. Closed in 1977. Following merger with Presbyterian and Congregational churches.
- 1861 A telegraph line and office was established. A post office was established in 1862 and was located in a part of the old police station. A telephone exchange was established in 1905.
- 1861 First police presence in Penshurst in run-down premises of a dwelling house and detached stone building with shingle roof, containing a stable and two stalls. Buildings formerly used by the Aboriginal Protector. (Continued page 20)

Something for the children


Crafting an autumn leaf suncatcher

Make your windows beautiful and keep the children entertained at the same time with this activity. You'll need tissue paper in colours like yellow, orange, red and brown, as well as some sticky back plastic.

Cut the plastic into any kind of leaf shape you like - perhaps a variety if you're making a few. Get your child to cut or tear up the tissue paper and use the sticky side of the plastic to create a collage.

When they've covered the surface, get a second sheet of sticky back plastic to stick over the tissue paper and see the design. They might also like to make a border for the leaves out of other coloured paper you have lying around, even old wallpaper or magazine cuttings can work. Finally, stick the leaves in the window and watch the lovely autumn sunlight come shining through. You can learn how to make a cellophane suncatcher here.

You can use the same process to make smaller leaves and string them together for hanging suncatchers.

Penshurst Portraits - Timelines (continued from page 20)

1861 - Penshurst was officially named by the Victorian Governor, Sir Henry Barkley on February 18th. It was formally notified in the Government Gazette on February 25th.

1861 - Price of Wales Hotel built, having 10 rooms and a ballroom. The hotel burned down in November 1972.

ca. 1862 - The Tannery in Bell Street was established by Aitkin and Son. It supplied Hamilton dealers, and also some in Melbourne.

1861 - Penshurst Hotel built. The Victorian Governor, Viscount Canterbury, stayed there in 1871. The Hotel was gutted by fire in 1995, but rebuilt. Originally it had a two storey balcony.

Ca. 1860's - Originally Olle's and subsequently Madigan's Store, for many years owned by the Madigans.

1862 - The poor quality of the Aboriginal Protectorate buildings saw Constable Samuel Watson given permission to rent a stone cottage and stables in the new police residence from Mr. Henry Walters for 30 pounds per annum. It is believed to have been on the block between Bell St. and Cox St. formerly occupied by Mr Bill Ross. The next mention of a new police residence in the town is in 1878 in Scales Street.

1863 - Boram Boram Cemetery Trust established. Lots were drawn for the different religious denominations to take up various parts of the cemetery. The cemetery was proclaimed in January, 1964, but it was likely to have been used for burials in the 1850s.

1864 - Mt Rouse Shire proclaimed on January 18th and the first meeting was held at Penshurst on February 3rd. A foundation stone was laid on February 11th. The Shire Chambers were added to the hall in 1977. The extension on the back of the buildings were added in 1962 to house the Engineering department. With the departure of the Shire in 1994, the building is home to a number of community Groups. Daniel Ritchie was first Shire President.

1864 - The Hamilton Spectator reported that Dr WM Dickerson practised medicine from rooms opposite the council chambers in Penshurst.


1865 - Penshurst Racing Club formed. Races had been held at Boram Boram opposite the Mt Rouse Inn on the Penshurst - Hamilton Rd. as early as 1859.

1865 - Presbyterian Church built. It costs 560 pounds.

1865 - Albion Hotel opened with David Munro as Licensee. It closed in 1872.

1865 - The Victorian Gazetteer said Penshurst had a population of about 400.
