

COUNCIL SUPPORTS ENVIRONMENTAL UPGRADE AGREEMENT FOR GREENER FUTURE

Southern Grampians Shire Council endorsed to support a new Environmental Upgrade Agreement for local businesses for the next two years at the ordinary March Council meeting.

The Agreement will enable local businesses to access government-enabled finance for solar and building upgrades to be more environmentally friendly, improve overall sustainability and address climate change issues.

Businesses may also replace lighting, install water efficiency initiatives, electric vehicle charging stations, waste management systems, pollution control and more under the guidelines. Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Councillor David Robertson said the new agreement will provide local businesses a great opportunity to make sustainable changes for a brighter future. "It's been a key focus for our Council to not only look at what we as an organisation is doing in relation to improving practices for the environment but also what we can do to support our community in also making positive changes for the sustainability of the region," said Cr Robertson. "An Environment Upgrade Agreement of EUA is an agreement between a building owner, bank and building owner's council that facilitates an upgrade to the building to improve the overall environmental performance.

"Local business owners can take out a long-term loan for the works, which is then repaid through the business Council rates," said Cr Robertson.

Eligibility criteria applies that business owners must pay Council rates, funding must be for a retrofit project in a non-residential building, and the project must also deliver environmental benefits in either energy, waste, and/or water.

Council have appointed Sustainable Australia Fund to work collaboratively with Council to establish, administer and support the delivery of the EUA's trading as Better Building Finance. To date, Better Building Finance has worked with local councils to facilitate more than 100 environmental upgrade projects at an investment of more than \$40 million, generating almost 10,000kW of solar power, which will reduce carbon emissions by around 500k tonnes over the life of the projects.

The term of the loan can be up to 20 years with four repayments per year which in some instances can generate cash flow positive to businesses when the savings are higher than the repayments. "If you are an interested local business, I'd encourage you to get in touch with Council and have a chat today about eligibility and what you would like to do to improve the carbon footprint of your business," concluded Cr Robertson.

Caramut and District Garden Club

A few days ago I was cleaning up a bed where there are daffodils and jonquils growing. Grape hyacinths, freesias and other bulbs will also do this. Quite a few of the bulbs were lying on the top. Many years ago when I discovered this, I went to replant them where they were lying but discovered there were bulbs underneath. Over the years, the bulbs multiply by having bulblets growing underneath or along the side of the original bulb. As they mature, they tend to push the original bulb out. So I end up replanting them elsewhere, giving them away or composting them. Many other bulbs do this also.



Now is a good time to plant spring growing bulbs of all kinds. When checking on the professional notes, I read, take out the

hyacinth and tulip bulbs out of the crisper where you stored them. The theory is that the bulbs need to be chilled before they will flower again next season. I have never done this and the tulip bulbs that were growing near the orange tree when we bought our home 20 years ago are still flowering in the same spot.

Plant winter vegetables such as broad beans, broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, leeks, peas, spinach and silver beet.

Autumn leaves can be put in the compost heap or in my case, I use them as mulch on the flower beds to keep the weeds down. Bulbs will push their way through as will some persistent weeds.





Karen Martini's chocolate hot cross buns

Prep Time 2 hours+ Cooking Time 25 mins Serves 12

INGREDIENTS

1 large orange60g dark chocolate buttons40g peeled ginger, chopped50g milk chocolate buttons

7g (1 sachet) dried yeast
230ml warm water
400g plain flour
100g wholemeal flour

For the sugar syrup
100g caster sugar
80ml water

50g unsalted butter, diced, at room temperature For the chocolate cross

35g caster sugar
30g plain flour
15g mixed spice
60ml cold water
12g cocoa powder
10g fine sea salt
20g cocoa powder

2 drops orange essence or orange oil

METHOD

- 1. Boil the orange whole for 45 minutes, then quarter and remove the seeds and central membrane, leaving the peel on. Blitz with the ginger in a blender until smooth; you'll need about 220g of puree.
- 2. For the sugar syrup, heat the sugar and water in a small saucepan until the sugar dissolves, then set aside to cool.
- 3. Dissolve the yeast in the warm water and set aside for 5 minutes to activate.
- 4. Place the flours, butter, sugar, mixed spice, cocoa, salt, orange essence and the orange and ginger puree in a stand mixer. Combine on a medium speed with the dough hook, pouring in the yeasted water. Mix for 10 minutes until a soft, smooth dough forms. Add the chocolate buttons and mix for a couple of minutes to combine. Tip the dough onto a bench and rest for 20 minutes.
- 5. Once rested, divide the dough into 12 even pieces and roll into balls. Place on a lined baking tray about 2-3cm apart, cover with a tea towel and set aside for 2-3 hours until they've doubled in size.
- 6. When ready to bake, preheat oven to 220C fan-forced (240C conventional).
- 7. To make the crosses, combine the ingredients in a bowl, then transfer to a piping bag with a small (about 5mm) plain nozzle. Pipe crosses onto the buns, then bake for about 25 minutes until risen and coloured.
- 8. Brush the buns with sugar syrup as soon as they come out of the oven, then set them aside to cool a little before eating while still warm. To reheat buns, toast them or warm in the oven.

Serving suggestion: I also love these buns toasted, with that little bit of extra crunch, again with the butter barely managing to hold its form as it slips into the bun.


