Good evening everyone,

Having just re-read the last PPA editorial I can only say that at the end I was in a tearing hurry and didn't get Tom to spell/everything-check it. I apologise. I also have to advise that last fortnight's newsletter was a short print run. For those who don't know, that means I didn't print the usual 170. The printer ran out of toner at 102, and Grangeburn IT, who supplies it for us, was also out .. and remained that way until Wednesday of the following week .. So I only printed another 20 and split them at the Post Office and Supermarket. Here's hoping that doesn't happen again. I have arranged to get extra toner.

Our next PPA meeting will be on Wednesday 28th September, 7.30pm. It is the first after the winter break .. but obviously winter hasn't left yet, going by the weather over the past few days. Mind you, I do love the sound of the wind whistling through our ash trees, and around the corners of the house.

Ok, now the challenges .. The Council has announced they are combining departments, among other changes, which leaves everything we've been working on floating in mid air. I have had a report from them that the concrete and new building for the Green Space has not yet received planning approval, and I can't even predict when things will return to anything vaguely resembling normal (not that I have ever known what that looks like). In the meantime we have had the first of three reports on the Hall returned. This one was a safety inspection done by a representative of the Council. While some changes are cosmetic, others are going to cost serious money. The second inspection was on behalf of DELWP, the owners of the building. We have not had the results of that yet, but are sure it will highlight some of the same problems, but, as I was advised by the gentleman at the time, the inspections are being done so that DELWP can tell the management committee what needs to be repaired to bring the Hall 'up to code', but, as usual, they have no funds to help pay for it. The third inspection will be done by the CFA to advise whether the building is suitable to become the 'Bushfire Place of Last Resort'. The real problem is that the Hall does not have a great deal of money in the bank to cover the cost of the changes needed by the first inspection, so I will be talking to DELWP, and whomever else I can find, to try and find the funding, as I imagine, a great many other hall committees will also be doing.

Update: Today (Monday) I contacted the DELWP representative for the region and we might be able to access funds to change all the required doors through a grant to bring them 'up to code' after the end of this month.

What to grow when it rains a lot

You don't necessarily need a pond for growing water lilies; they'll also thrive in a big tub like a stock tank on your patio. They grow from tubers planted in pots beneath the water and send up stems with rounded leaves and star-shaped blossoms that float on the surface. Water lilies bloom in a variety of colours including pink, white, yellow, and red. A good choice for beginners, hardy lilies are dependable and easy to plant. They blossom in the morning and close after sunset,



usually lasting three or four days before sinking back beneath the surface. The flowers appear from spring to autumn and go dormant in the winter.

Step 1: Select a Container

Use a wide and shallow container. A good size is 18 inches wide by at least 10 inches deep. The tuber, which is similar to the rhizome of an <u>iris</u>, grows horizontally. You can use a container with or without drainage holes. If there are drainage holes, line the pot with burlap to keep the soil in the container. Soil that leaches out can cloud the water in your pond.

Step 2: Fill Container With Soil

Use a heavy bagged soil intended for use in the garden, not a fluffy potting soil that will float out of the container. Avoid soil mixes with peat, vermiculite, or perlite for the same reason. Enrich the soil with aquatic fertilizer pellets especially for the task. Push them into the soil before you plant.

Step 3: Clean Up Plants

Before planting water lilies, check the tubers and remove old leaves and thick, fleshy old roots; then, more of the plant's energy can go toward growing new roots, leaves, stems, and blooms. Leave only emerging leaves and buds and the newer, hairlike roots.

Step 4: Plant Tubers

Plant the tuber against the side of the pot, with the growing tip pointing upward (about 45 degrees) and toward the centre of the pot.

Step 5: Add Gravel

Cover the soil with a layer of small rocks or pea gravel to keep the soil in the pot.

Step 6: Lower Plant into Water

The planted pot should be lowered into the pond at an angle to allow air to escape. Set the base of the pot 30 to 45 centimetres deep. The leaves will float to the surface. If the pond is deeper than 18 inches and doesn't have built-in planting ledges, support the pot with rocks to keep it at about that depth.


How to Winterize Hardy Water Lilies

Begin getting your hardy water lilies ready for winter by removing all dead and dying foliage. If your pond freezes solid or if you drain it for the winter, remove the lily, pot and all. Store the entire pot by keeping it cool and moist in a plastic bag. If you can't store the whole pot, remove and clean the growing tuber and store it in peat moss or sawdust at 4°C to 10°C. If the pond doesn't freeze solid, don't remove the pot. Just lower it to the deepest part of the pond, where the water won't freeze. In spring, bring the pot back to the proper growing level in the pond. If you've dug up and stored the tuber, repot as if it were a new plant.

Penshurst Memorial Hall - For your information



As advised in the Council's safety inspection, the following doors do not have compliant door hardware. It is recommended to install a pushing action (Panic Bar) and/or a downward lever action handle on a single device, openable without a key from the side that faces a person seeking egress to the following doors: a) Provide a compliant single hand pushing action (Panic Bar) on a single device which is located between 900 mm and 1.2 m from the floor and remove any drop bolts or deadlatches to a required exit door in the following locations:



Illuminated Exit signs are required over a wider variety of doors, which must be wired in. The electrician and door company are going to love us.



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A PAGE TO SHARE RECIPES

SMOKED SALMON & POTATO GRATIN

Prep Time 30 mins Cooking Time 2 hour Serves 6

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tbsp rice flour
 30g sachet salt-reduced taco seasoning
 600g skinless firm white fish fillets, cut
 into 2cm-thick strips (see note)
 1/4 cup vegetable oil
 8 multigrain tortillas
 1 mango, diced
- red capsicum, diced
 tbsp lime juice, plus wedges, to serve
 baby cos lettuce, leaves separated
 large avocado, sliced
 cup sour cream
 1/4 cup sweet chilli sauce
 1/3 cup fresh coriander leaves

METHOD

· Step 1

Combine rice flour and taco seasoning in a large snap-lock bag. Add fish . Seal bag. Toss to coat.

· Step 2

Heat oil in a large non-stick frying pan over high heat. Cook fish, in batches, for 2 to 3 minutes each side or until golden and crisp and just cooked through.

· Step 3

Meanwhile, heat tortillas in microwave following packet directions.

· Step 4

Combine mango, capsicum and lime juice in a bowl. Season with salt and pepper. Place tortillas on serving plates. Top with lettuce, avocado, capsicum and mango salsa. Dollop with sour cream and drizzle with sweet chilli sauce. Sprinkle with coriander leaves. Fold tortillas to enclose filling. Serve with lime wedges.





- 1. Hole in skull between eye socket and nostril

Meet the family

Just like a family tree shows your ancestors and present-day relatives, an evolutionary tree shows how dinosaurs are related to other groups of animals and to each other. Dinosaurs (those that are extinct and living birds) are part of the evolutionary tree of amniotes. The first amniotes were primitive four-legged reptiles from which all other reptiles and mammals evolved. One branch of early reptiles led to the archosaurs – the group that includes dinosaurs, crocodiles, and pterosaurs. Dinosaurs themselves are split into two main groups based on their hip structure, and then smaller branches based on other shared features.

Revisiting Dinosaurs


Dinosaurs include extinct animals we know from fossils and the birds we see today. The extinct animals we normally think of as dinosaurs had their heyday in the Mesozoic.

The word 'dinosaur' means 'terrible lizard' in Greek. It was coined in 1842 by Sir Richard Owen, an English Professor of Comparative Anatomy and Physiology. When an animal is called a dinosaur it means that the animal belongs to the group Dinosauria.

The three main groups within Dinosauria are:

1. Ornithiscians including *Triceratops*, *Centrosaurus* and *Stegosaurus* and

2. Sauropods like *Brachiosaurus*, *Argentinosaurus*, and the Australian *Diamantinasaurus matildae* Theropods which includes *Australovenator (below)*, tyrannosaurs and the birds living today
