

AUSTRALIA DAY AWARD NOMINATIONS OPENING SOON

Nominations for the 2023 Southern Grampians Shire Council Australia Day Awards open Monday 10 October 2022. Each year, the awards are presented to individuals and groups in recognition of their achievements across the Southern Grampians which are celebrated with the community. Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Cr Bruach Colliton said the Australia Day Awards are always a highlight and great way to begin the year.

"We are so privileged to celebrate our Award recipients who demonstrate such a commitment to the wellbeing of our Southern Grampians community," said Cr Colliton. "By nominating your friend, family member, or a local you know for an Award, it is the perfect way to recognise the special role they have within the Southern Grampians and to celebrate their achievements."

The Southern Grampians Shire Council 2023 Australia Day Awards, includes four categories:

- Young Citizen of the Year for residents aged under 25 who have made a significant contribution to the community in the current year or over a number of years.
- Citizen of the Year for residents over 25 who have achieved the most distinguished performance and/or made the most outstanding contribution to the Shire community in the current year or over a number of years.
- The Community Event of the Year to the group or person who has staged the most outstanding community event, between 30 October 2021 and 30 October 2022. This could be a single day event, a multiple day event or a virtual event.
- Community Recognition for an individual/group based in the Southern Grampians who has made a significant contribution to the local community in the current year or over a number of years.

Recipients of the awards will be announced by the Mayor at Council's official Australia Day celebrations on 26 January 2023. "If someone you know deserves recognition for their contribution to our region, whether that's for an event they organised or if they have made an outstanding effort to improve the lives of others, nominate them. We ask that you take your time with the nomination and include examples of why the nominee is a deserving recipient. It's your chance to really highlight their work and shine a bright light on what makes them such an exemplary member of the Southern Grampians," concluded Cr Colliton.

BOOSTING COMMMUNITY PROJECTS WITH COUNCIL GRANTS

Southern Grampians Shire Council has allocated approximately \$71,000 to community projects in the first round of the 2022/2023 Greater Grants program. Each year, Council aims to support the delivery of community led projects via two rounds of funding opportunities spread across community strengthening, arts and culture, infrastructure, events and tourism, sustainability, and heritage. Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Bruach Colliton said the Greater Grants program offers much needed financial assistance to community groups and individuals to develop important community projects.

"We are continually impressed with the ideas and quality of projects coming from the grassroots of our community with this round being no exception," said Cr Colliton. "Council has allocated \$70,833.97 for this round which will enable \$120,000 worth of community driven and innovative projects to get off the ground, a great partnership with local organisations. After a long two years for the events industry, it has been especially pleasing to see some great events being added back into the calendar including a Family Fun Day in Coleraine, Country Music Festival in Hamilton and the Fleece and Flower Show in Cavendish. "We have also been really excited by some of the larger funding applications received including the Branxholme Recreation Reserve which have been successful in securing a grant for a fit out of the Women's Netball Changeroom which will support future netballers."

HOWZAT – COUNCIL TO SUPPORT LOCAL CRICKET VICTORIA EVENTS

Southern Grampians Shire Council has committed to a three-year sponsorship agreement with Cricket Victoria to support the Under 16 Premier League Carnival and other local Cricket Victoria events. The agreement will be reviewed annually with \$10,000 to be allocated from Council's events budget each year. Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Cr Bruach Colliton said there were clear long-term community benefits to the funding agreement.

"Last year's Under 16 Premier League Carnival hosted by Cricket Victoria saw an economic boost of approximately \$175,000 into the Southern Grampians region," said Cr Colliton. "Over 50 families stayed in the region across the weeklong carnival which of course sees a positive impact in accommodation bookings, hospitality venues as well as retail which provided local businesses with increased opportunities. Events and activities like these have the dual benefit of helping to support our local cricket community while promoting the people and places of the Southern Grampians to the wider region."

"Cricket Victoria wants to showcase the fantastic grounds we have within the shire and give all players the opportunity to play in different conditions. They utilise local umpires for the carnival to support their development and various local Clubs are paid to get grounds ready for the Carnival. The Youth Premier League embraces talented players with varied backgrounds from across all of Victoria to be the best player they can be. We look forward to welcoming players and their families back later in the year for the 2022 carnival," concluded Cr Colliton.

The three-year agreement supports key performance indicators of the 2021-25 Council Plan to encourage participation in leisure, recreation and sporting opportunities; to promote appropriate services, facilities and activities for young people; whilst also improving the reputation of the region as a destination of choice for events. With other Cricket Hubs being finalised in Victoria, there will be greater competition for junior carnivals. This approach locks in Southern Grampians hosting of this event for years to come.

- Western Country presentations
- U19 Victorian Male State Squad for three days in September

Caramut and District Garden Club

October is a busy time in the garden as we have spring weather and at times, nearly summery type weather. With all the rain and some warmer days, the weeds have taken off very quickly. Try and get rid of them all before they flower and seed to lessen weed growth in future years. As well as weeds, all other types of plants are growing well this season. Despite the rain, the warmer days means that pot plants in the sun tend to dry out very quickly.

Soaking pots in a container of water is much better than a light sprinkle. Use the finger to measure moisture content in the pots and water if needed.

With the ground warming up, many seeds can be planted now in well prepared soil. Sunflowers, nasturtiums, marigolds, impatiens, sweet peas. In the vegie garden beans, beetroot, carrots, leeks, pumpkin, parsnip, peas, silver beet, sweet corn can be planted.



As camellias finish flowering, and all spring-flowering shrubs can be shaped, pruned or trimmed back. This encourages compact growth and a great display of blooms next spring.

Mulching garden beds well conserves water. This prevents the soil and plants from drying out rapidly and reducing the need for watering. Just because plants wilt on a hot day doesn't necessarily mean they need watering. Use the finger water metre to check the moisture content of the soil. If damp, once the heat of the sun goes, you will find the plants stand upright again. Mulching also helps to smother weeds from growing and stops them from competing with your plants.

- 1½ tbsp instant coffee, dissolved in 1 tbsp hot water
- strawberry jam (optional)
- walnuts or cherries, to decorate (optional)

METHOD

STEP 1

Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan. Line and butter two 18cm sandwich tins. Add the sugar and butter to a bowl and whisk until very fluffy and pale.

STEP 2

Whisk the eggs in a mug with a fork, then add them gradually to the mixture with 1 tbsp of flour each time. (Make sure you don't use all the flour.) When the eggs have been fully combined into the mix, add the rest of the flour, and fold it in gently.



STEP 3

Add the dissolved coffee to the mixture, still folding. Divide into the sandwich tins and cook for 25-30 min until risen and firm and a skewer inserted into the middle comes out clean. Leave to cool in the tin for 5 mins then turn out onto a wire rack to cool completely. *Can be frozen at this stage.*

STEP 4

Meanwhile, make the icing by beating the icing sugar with the butter until light and fluffy, then add the dissolved coffee. Whisk, then cover and set aside until ready to ice the cake.

STEP 5

Spread half the icing on the bottom of one sponge and spread the strawberry jam on the bottom of the other, if using. Sandwich together, then spread the remaining icing on top. Decorate with walnuts or cherries if you like.


