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Historical Society member gains recognition

The society has decided to honour long time researcher, archivist and secretary, Val Heffernan, by naming one of its research rooms after her.

A public ceremony honouring Val and her tremendous work will be held at the Penshurst Courthouse this Saturday at 10.30am.

A former historical society president, Brian O'Brien, said the amount of work Val had done for the society couldn't be calculated.

"I remember telling her about 15 years ago that we had a mass of material at the Courthouse but it was all over the place, in boxes, under benches, and needed to be sorted and catalogued," Mr O'Brien said

"Val lived in Hamilton and was a member of the Hamilton : History Centre, so I thought it was highly unlikely she would be :... interested in Penshurst history.



NEW MAYOR AND DEPUTY MAYOR ELECTED

Southern Grampians Shire Council elected Cr David Robertson as Mayor and Cr Helen Henry as Deputy Mayor for 2022/23 at last night's Statutory Meeting. Cr Robertson, who was elected unopposed, acknowledged the privilege and honour it is to be elected Mayor of the Southern Grampians.

"Firstly I would like to thank my fellow Councillors for their support in nominating myself to the role of Mayor," said Cr Robertson. "I really see Council as a service industry where we are here to serve our residents and ratepayers well."

Cr Robertson also acknowledged the tight economic landscape Council must continue to navigate to deliver on key projects for the community.

"As a Council, we are full of conceptual ideas and detailed plans which we will have shovel ready so when the scarce resources and opportunities come through, our Council will be prepared. "We will continue to pressure Governments and we will continue to get jobs done for the people of the Southern Grampians. We are all in this together and as Mayor, my door is always open so please come and see me. I also have to commend Cr Bruach Colliton on his leadership, direction and commitment over the past two years as Mayor. We have achieved many accomplishments under his guidance which puts us in a good place to continue that work into our third and fourth year as a Council," concluded Cr Robertson.

Deputy Mayor Cr Henry was elected unopposed with Council resolving to appoint the Mayor and Deputy Mayor for a one year term. The Council meeting schedule was also set for the second Wednesday of each month except January 2023, commencing at 5:30pm with next year's Statutory Meeting scheduled for 1 November 2023.

Caramut and District Garden Club

Why does grass grow where you do not want it and not grow where you do?

With all the rain we have been having since the flooding rains of Friday 22nd, the weeds are having a ball. To weed at present, even if not raining, one would become very wet from the surrounding wet plants. Feet would become very bogged. Most plants that stand in wet soil for too long will eventually rot. I was able to collect suitable potting material from the drive after the water subsided.

Geraniums and Pelargoniums come mostly from South Africa. Zonal geraniums flower almost continuously while Regal Pelargoniums rival azaleas for beauty and need much less water. Ivy leafed geraniums will cascade down a bank, or, if supported, climb a wall flowering from spring to autumn. While scented leafed geraniums with their abundance of foliage are suitable for pot-pourri or bath bags. I love touching them in the garden for the delightful perfume when the leaves are rubbed. There are also miniature varieties. Colours range from pure white through shades of pink and lavender to red and there are a number of with attractive variegated foliage. They are hardy plants that tolerate sun and drought and require good drainage although they will look and do better with regular watering.

I first grew them along the west side of the house before the garden was established. By regular tidying up in winter, they remained nice and compact, with abundant flowers. If left to their own devices, geraniums become long and leggy and their flowers very small. Most unattractive. Unfortunately the shrubs planted further out, bringing lovely shade to the house stopped the geraniums from flowering well. Geraniums don't really like much frost, but so long as you only trim them up after the winter, will not be killed by the frost. Dwarf and compact varieties are ideally suited to pots. Ivy leaf varieties have a climbing or trailing habit, which are ideal for hanging baskets. I have an ivy leaf, small flowered one growing in a very large pot on a raised bench which does very well. Even better when I remember to water it in the summer.

Unfortunately, due to the flooding, or at least, water logged Hamilton Gardens, the meeting on Tuesday 8th November which was to visit two gardens in Hamilton has been called off. But you can visit the Green Hills Open Garden on Sunday 13th November 11.00am- 4.00pm. This is a fund raiser for the Penshurst Hospital in memory of Kit Boyd who was a Garden Club member. Due to rain, this was postponed from 30th October.

COMMUNITY LOCAL LAW READY FOR RESIDENT FEEDBACK

Residents are encouraged to provide feedback on the draft 2022 Community Local Law after Council made revisions on the 2021 version to improve overall clarity. The document, which outlines Southern Grampians Shire Council Community Local Law, is put in place to protect the amenity of the municipality and the health and safety of the community. Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Cr David Robertson said the Community Local Law document has been updated with a number of amendments which will enable officers to improve definitions of existing laws and leave less room for ambiguity. "The Community Local Law is an important document as it helps our officers to create an environment that is equitable and fair to residents, businesses and visitors alike, enabling them to participate in community life with mutual respect for people and places," said Cr Robertson. "One of the changes from the 2015 Community Local Law will assist Council Officers to ensure property owners maintain the appearance of residences giving authorised staff the ability to address those dilapidated buildings for both private residences and businesses across the region. We will also be looking at implementing a cat curfew in coming years which will help to address the large feral cat population currently within some areas of the Shire. If adopted, Cat owners will be required to confine their animal to their property between sunset and sunrise to help reduce the destruction of native animal populations. This measure is not unique as is already being successfully implemented in other municipalities across the State. The infringement penalties have also been updated in line with the Attorney-General's guidance and we have removed the reference to Lake Hamilton and activities on waterways to ensure there is no duplication of provisions and offences under the Marine Safety Act 2010."

The 2022 Community Local Law will also feature:

- The introduction of permits for the planting of vegetation along roads (including nature strips);
- Permits for scavenging at Council Transfer stations to improve safety of residents;
- Regulation of feeding uncaged birds and animals on public and private property to reduce problematic animals.

"For those of you who are viewing this document for the first time, or for those who may have submitted earlier suggestions, have a read through the draft document and tell us what you think," concluded Cr Robertson.

Fun for the kids


The rules are as follows:

- 1. The numbers you can use are from 1 to 6.
- 2. In each row and in each column each number can appear only once (just like in Sudoku).
- 3. Each "cage" (the blocks with the thick border) shows a result and an operation (addition: +, subtraction: -, multiplication: x, or division: /). The operation applied to the numbers in the cage should produce the result shown.
- 4. A number may be used more than once in the same cage, but not more than once in each row or column.

In case of subtraction or division, arrange the numbers from the cage from largest to smallest. If the outcome = 1- and the numbers in the cage are 1, 2, 4 then you need to arrange them into 4 - 2 - 1.



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Pasta with Mint and Parmesan

Prep Time 20 mins Cooking Time 20 mins Serves 3 - 4

INGREDIENTS

· Salt and freshly ground black pepper · 100g butter (4 tablespoons), cut into to taste

· 500g cut pasta, like ziti or penne, or long pasta, like linguine or spaghetti

pieces

· ½ cup chopped mint leaves · 1 cup freshly grated Parmesan

METHOD

Step 1

Bring a large pot of water to a boil and salt it. When it boils, cook pasta until it is tender but not mushy. Drain pasta, reserving about ½ cup of cooking liquid.

Step 2

Toss pasta in a warmed bowl with 2 or 3 tablespoons cooking liquid, the butter, mint and half the cheese. Taste and adjust seasoning, then serve, passing remaining Parmesan at the table.
