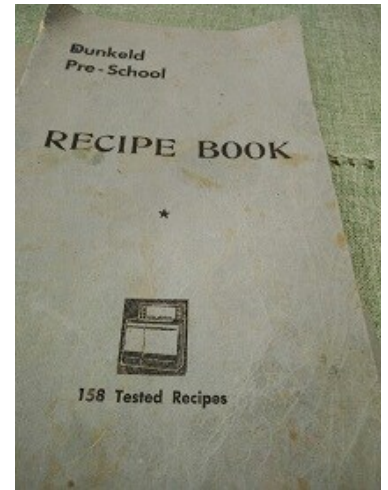

So far inquiries have not been successful. We would like to establish the date of printing and some background as to how the book came about. It is thought that it is connected to the Soldier Settler History of that area and may have been compiled and organized to print by the wives of Soldier Settlers of the time, sometime in the 1950s, 1957?

Acanthus Oyster Plant. The magnificent summer flowers of the *Acanthus mollis* can grow nearly head-high. The flower looks like an oyster, hence the common name. The plant is common in Eastern Mediterranean countries and usually seen growing in woodlands and olive groves. The info says the soil must be well watered and rich to promote rapid growth. Mine only has rain water. Any open, sunny aspect or partly shaded position will do. Mine faces east against a wall and surrounded by other plants. I was surprised to find lots of seedlings growing under plants or in the open ground. Had wondered why the plant was growing further out from its original position.

The photo shows a shooting seed with the long tap root. The original plant can be divided and the sections planted out. Too much like hard work to me especially

after seeing all the sprouting seeds.

There have been a few frosts and the temptation is to "tidy up" the burnt sections of the plant. DON'T as if there is another frost after, it burns more of the plant which would eventually die. The burnt section will prevent further damage.

Arrive Camperdown Botanic Gardens approximately 10.00am. Morning tea, meet some Timboon Garden Club members, look around the Gardens.

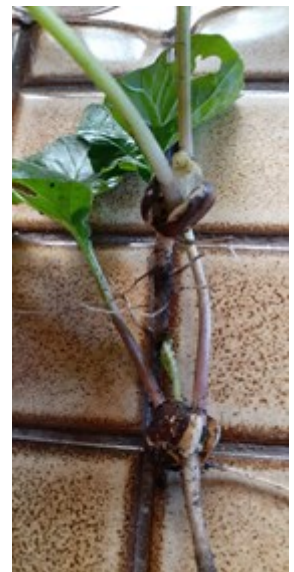
Visit a local garden. This is yet to be confirmed.

My grandmother's tears

It was one of those podcast things that I was listening to in the car. The interview was called 'The bookbinders luck' and it was with Dominic Riley.

Part of the interview went like this.

A woman brought her bible in to be repaired and Dominic patiently explained the process of reparation.

"We can repair the pages, invisibly with Japanese paper, we can resow and bind the cover and when we get to the front cover itself, I can remove these stains."

At this the woman slammed her hand down on the counter. She was so angry with me and I didn't know why.

And she said

"I don't want you to touch those stains.

This is my grandmother's book.

She died in the camps.

My mother survived and those are my grandmother's tears."

A few things to draw out of this very poignant and touching story.

Our book binder Dominic learnt on that day to ask a simple question.

'Do these stains mean anything to you?' It's not hard and it doesn't cost anything, but sensitivity and wisdom is a necessity. Always ask and be prepared to listen.

Secondly, what looks like a mess and might well be perceived as something to hide away and/or be discarded, can actually be priceless. Like the grandmother's tears, it could be irreplaceable.

Finally tears are an ethereal gift. They are authentic and beautiful. In the case of the family bible they are all that the grandmother could offer her descendants. They came without cost, they are intimate and profoundly personal. Sometimes in life they are all we have to offer. From the grandmother's perspective it may not have seemed like a lot, but from her family's perspective ... Those stains continue to be the symbol of overflowing and unending love.

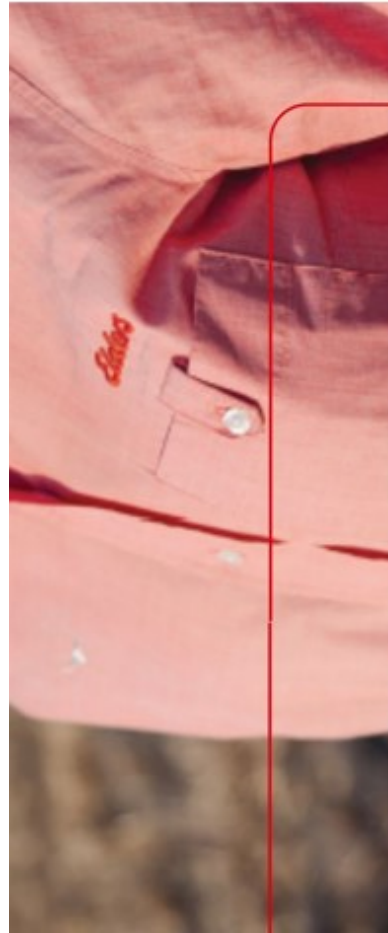

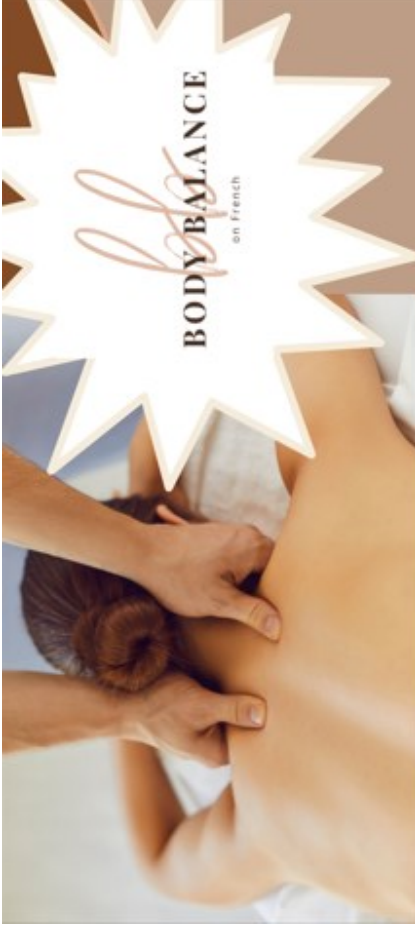

COUNCIL ASKS COMMUNITY TO CONSIDER EV CHARGING STATION LOCATION

Southern Grampians Shire Council is commencing community engagement to determine the location of the EVIE Networks EV Charging Station in Hamilton. Earlier this year, an EV charging station was installed in Hamilton, east of the Beersheba Memorial Park and directly west of the Hamilton Uniting Church. Following installation, Council received requests for the charging station be relocated. Following those conversations, Council have been working with EVIE Networks to explore suitable alternative locations. Council is now asking the community to consider three options which have been identified and approved as suitable by both EVIE Networks and Council.

Southern Grampians Shire Councillor CEO Tony Doyle said EVIE Networks have assessed the Hamilton CBD for alternative sites. "There are several things to consider when choosing a charging location and a number of potentially great locations in the CBD had to be dismissed due to road safety concerns, private land ownership, power issues or accessibility.

"We now have three potential locations to put forward and we ask that the community consider these options and vote for what they believe to be the most appropriate location for the EV charging station in Hamilton," said Mr Doyle.

The potential locations are:

Hamilton Place; behind Hamilton Visitor Information Centre
Thompson Street; directly opposite the Shell Service Station
EV Charger remains in current location.

"The Hamilton Place location, behind the Visitor Information Centre, provides safe access for drivers while charging. It is close to the Hamilton CBD, has no drainage issues and is Council owned land. Thompson Street, opposite Shell, is also close to the CBD, has large bays and presents an opportunity to re-line mark to manage safety requirements, but it is a high-traffic area on a main arterial road.

"It is up to the community to guide Council on the preferred option, and we ask as many people as possible to please take two minutes to complete the survey," said Mr Doyle.

Southern Grampians Shire was allocated two EVIE Networks Electric Vehicle Charging Stations as a part of the Destination Charging Across Victoria state government program; one each in Dunkeld and Hamilton.

A PAGE TO SHARE RECIPES

Freeze ahead choc-mint cheesecake

Prep Time 8h 45 mins Cooking Time 5 mins Serves 10

INGREDIENTS

350g packet frozen Sara Lee Chocolate Cake
3 x 118g packet Nestlé Aero Mint chocolate
300ml carton thickened cream
150ml double cream

1 tsp peppermint extract
Green liquid food colouring, to tint
35g Nestlé Peppermint Crisp bar, broken
into shards
After dinner mint chocolates, to decorate
Darrell Lea Minty Crunchy Chocolate Balls
Milk Chocolate, to decorate

Mint cheesecake

250g packet cream cheese, at room
temperature, chopped

185ml (3/4 cup) thickened cream
160ml (2/3 cup) sweetened condensed milk
1/2 tsp peppermint extract
Green liquid food colouring, to tint

**Chocolate fudge
sauce**

200g dark chocolate,
finely chopped
185ml (3/4 cup)
thickened cream
1 tbsp golden syrup



METHOD

Step 1 Line a 7.5cm-deep, 8 x 27cm (base size) loaf pan with baking paper, allowing the paper to overhang the sides.

Step 2 Cut the cake in half crossways. Stand 1 half on its side, cut-side up, and trim 1cm off the cake base. Repeat with the remaining half. Place the halves, icing-side up, in the base of prepared pan. Use the cake offcuts to fill any gaps.

Step 3 To make the cheesecake, use electric beaters to beat cream cheese in a bowl until smooth. Add the cream, condensed milk and peppermint extract. Beat until well combined. Add colouring to tint mixture green. Beat until evenly coloured. Pour over cake base. Smooth surface. Place in freezer for 2 hours or until firm.

Step 4 Meanwhile, make the fudge sauce. Place all sauce ingredients in a small saucepan. Cook, stirring, over low heat until melted and smooth. Set aside for 1 hour or until cooled completely

Step 5 Transfer 1/4 cupful of fudge sauce to a microwave-safe jug. Cover and set aside. Pour 1/2 cupful of the remaining sauce over the cheesecake layer. Smooth the surface. Top with Aero, trimming to fit, then pour over 1/2 cupful of the remaining sauce. Top with Aero, trimming to fit. Pour over the remaining sauce and smooth the surface. Place in the freezer for 6 hours or overnight to set

Step 6 Use electric beaters to beat the thickened cream, double cream and peppermint extract in a bowl until soft peaks form. Add colouring to tint green. Beat until firm peaks form.

Step 7 Microwave the reserved fudge sauce on High for 20 seconds or until runny. Set aside to cool slightly. Half-fill sink with hot water. Place base of pan in water for 20 seconds. Transfer the cake to a serving plate. Top with the mint cream and Peppermint Crisp shards. Decorate with mint chocolates and balls. Drizzle over the fudge sauce to serve.

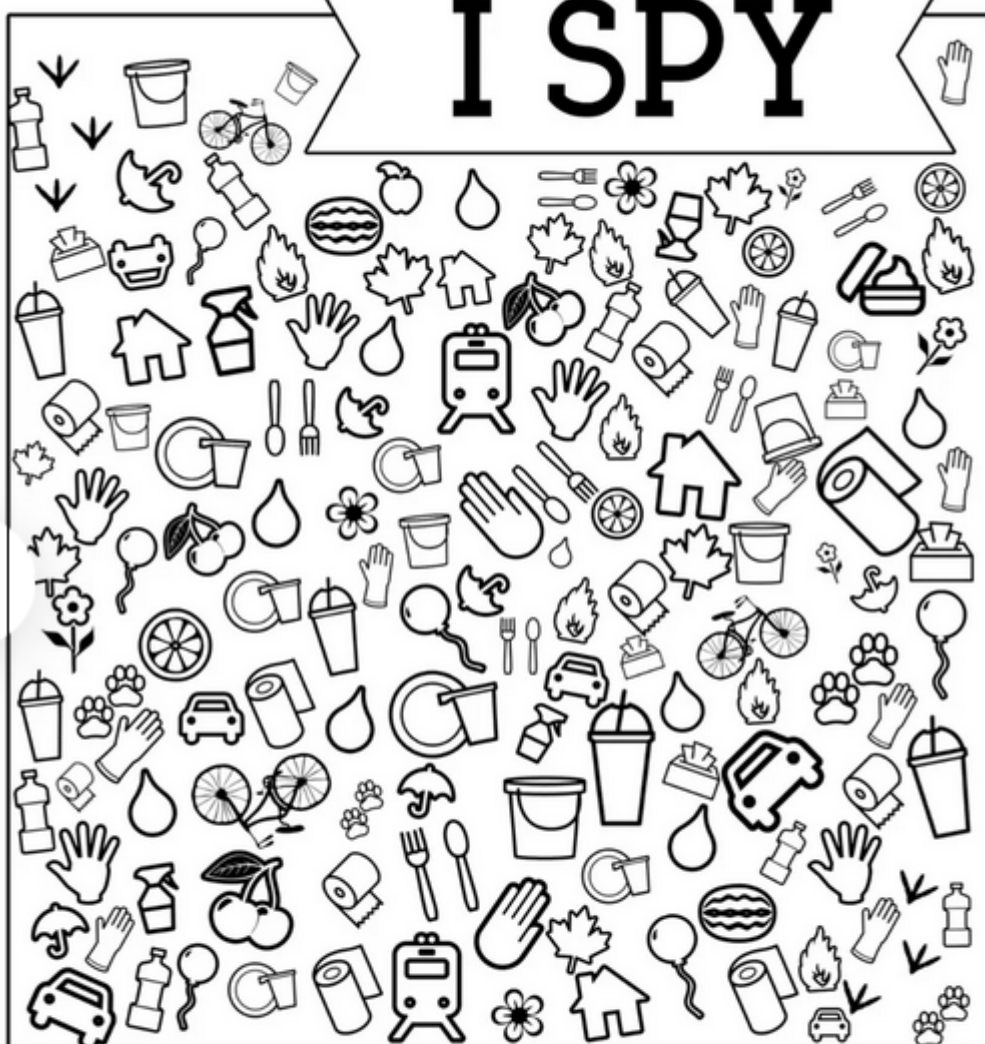

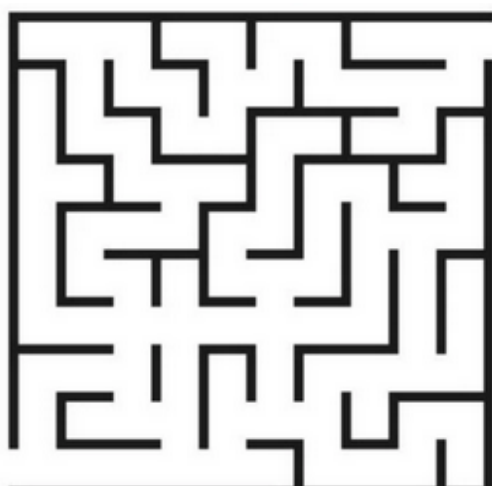
