Good afternoon everyone,

Another month slips away at high speed and I am left wondering what happened to January, among many other dates. Last fortnight, if you didn't find Ali's story, you'll see it overleaf.

Last Wednesday we had the Council Meeting followed by the Engagement Meeting. A number of us from the Progress Association met Councillors and Council staff in the Botanic Gardens in the late afternoon, where decisions were made, such as NOT cutting down any of the healthy trees, but instead changing the locations of the caravan sites to between them. There was talk of increasing the number of sites to twenty, of a few cabins, of the camp kitchen either being created in the old tennis court building, or the building coming down to be replaced by a purpose built one, or not. The old tennis court site could be converted to a multi-purpose kids' zone (no details on that yet). The new barbeque building was a hot topic, as is the idea of connecting the caravan park to the pool and putting in a manager (hence the expansion), which does away with the need for life guards during the summer, so that the pool can be open more often. Thankfully there was no discussion about closing the pool. Thank you to those who attended the Engagement meeting that evening. Many topics were raised, both personal and relating to the town.

Council has given permission for the next stage of the Green Space, which is information boards and the gardens themselves. And we move on from there.

In other business, the Hall Committee has purchased a new refrigerator, long overdue. It will be delivered sometime in the next few

weeks. The Council has told us that they have funding to upgrade the outside women's toilets, so I sent them the quotes to replace the big window as the frame is rusted and corroded, as are all the others around the hall, except for those recently replaced, and the glass is no longer compliant, given to breaking into sharp shards rather than pebbles. I've also been advised by Regional Development Victoria that a grant is soon to open that might get us the heater/airconditioners for the main hall. In the meantime, there are all sorts of ideas floating around for Hall, or Gardens, activities, and lovely locations to run them in. We look forward to more improvements on that building.

Speaking of activities - the request for recommencing the markets is increasing. From experience, I know how much work is involved in running them, so if some of you, who want to have tables there, would also like to help organise them, please contact me. The Progress Association works as a governing body for subcommittees, without making difficulties, and it would be good to see that activity return to the town in the next few months.

In the meantime, we am quietly working behind the scenes to create a town Christmas Party. The working date is Saturday 9th December, in the Botanic Gardens, if its dry, and in the Hall if not. There will a barbeque provided by the

Lions Club, among other activities. I'll talk about it more as plans progress.



Caramut and District Garden Club

Pride of Madeira *Echium candicans* This plant comes from the Canary Islands or Madeira. The bright blue, pink or purple flowers appear in late spring and summer. (Mine have been flowering for some weeks.) They have hairy leaves and if eaten, can cause stomach upsets.

They are very frost hardy and do well in a dry climate, well drained soil with full sun. I never water mine, but after a dry summer, they look rather unhappy. They seed freely and can also be grown from cuttings. In fact, they are a Weed Alert for much of the state. I planted one in the front garden from a small tube not knowing exactly what it was. Grew far too big for the area so pulled it out about 3 years ago. I'm still pulling out seedlings coming up from that one plant. There is another variety which doesn't grow so large and not so free seeding.

Each branch can reach up to 3.5 metres tall with the flower spikes reaching lengths of 200-400mm. The root system must be robust as it supports so many long flower stems. The photo is from my garden and is growing in an area where I don't mind how big it grows. Thankfully the weeds don't grow underneath and I don't do anything with it apart from admiring the flowers. There is also a very large specimen in the Penshurst Uniting Church grounds which looks great.

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



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A PAGE TO SHARE RECIPES

Tamales

Prep Time 25mins Cooking Time 20mins Serves 24

INGREDIENTS

Masa harina. Maize flour.

Broth: Beef, chicken or vegetable will

work.

Baking powder

Salt Cumin

Lard: lard is used in truly authentic Mexican tamales (and it has less saturated fat then butter)! Shortening would work

as a substitute.

Dried corn husks: 8 ounce package. Cabbage leaves can be used as a substitute.

The dough, called "masa" is spread on the corn husk. The corn husks do not get eaten, they are just used to envelope the dough and filling of the tamale which gets cooked inside.

METHOD

Soak the corn husks in a bowl of very hot water for 30 minutes or until softened.

Prepare desired fillings*.

Make the tamal dough: In a large bowl, use an electric mixer to beat the lard and 2 tablespoons of broth until fluffy, about 3-5 minutes. Combine the masa flour,

baking powder, salt, and cumin in a separate bowl; stir into the lard mixture and beat well with an electric mixer.

Add the broth, little by little to form a very soft dough. Beat on high speed for several minutes. The dough should spread

like creamy peanut butter and be slightly sticky.* Cover the mixing bowl with a damp paper towel, to keep the dough from drying out.

Assemble the tamales: Lay a corn husk, glossy side up, on the counter with the wide end at the top. Scoop about ½ cup of dough onto the top, centre of the corn husk. Lay a piece of plastic wrap over the dough and use your hands to press and spread the masa into a thin layer, about ¼ inch thick. Keep the dough spread along the *top half* of the corn husk to allow plenty of room to fold the bottom husk up, when it's time.

Place 1-2 tablespoons of desired filling in a line down the centre of the dough. (You don't want too much filling). Fold in one long side of the husk over the filling. Fold in the other long side, overlapping the first (like folding a brochure). Fold the bottom of the husk up.

Tying tamales (optional): You don't have to tie a corn husk string around the tamales--it does take more time and they will hold together without it. However, if you're making multiple fillings, tying ones of a certain kind can help to identify them.

Cook on the stove-top - in a steamer: Lay a few extra corn husks on the bottom rack to keep the tamales from falling through and any boiling water from directly touching them.

Place tamales standing upright, with their open end up, just tightly enough to keep them standing. Lay a few soaked corn husks or a wet towel over the top of the tamales before closing the lid. Bring water to a boil (in Mexico they would often place a coin at the bottom of the steamer and when the coin started to tap in the pot you know the water was boiling.) Once boiling, reduce to a simmer and steam for 45 minutes to 1 hour, or longer. Check them after 45 minutes.

To test if the tamales are done: Remove one and try to pull the husk off. If the husk pulls away cleanly from the tamale they're done. If the dough is still sticky or wet looking, cook them for 5-10 minutes longer and try again.

Store leftover tamales in the refrigerator for 5-7 days depending on the freshness of your ingredients.
