town. They help to add to the joy of Christmas after another busy year.



WORKS UPDATE

Penshurst Volcanoes Discovery Centre:

The front door banners at the entrance of Penshurst Volcanoes Discovery Centre were installed by the contractor last week. This week, several works were completed at the centre, including installation of entry pavers, painting of the front door, installation of LED lights for the shelter and volcano sign, and completion of the roof sheeting. The works at the centre is almost finished and the internal team will finish planting by the end of December 2023.



Penshurst Public Toilets (Memorial Hall):

An inspection has been carried out on the public toilets, and a scope of work is being developed for the renewal of various elements within the building. This will involve internal repairs and upgrades, such as plastering, painting, and the replacement of leaking fittings. The expected completion date for the works is by the end of April 2024.



Ritchie Street in Penhurst, specifically the south side that connects Martin Street to the entrance of Penhurst Primary School, is scheduled to undergo renewal works. The council is currently working on confirming the dates for each footpath work, and the program is set to begin in January 2024.



Drainage Works:

Currently civil design work is ongoing to address drainage issues on Cox Street in Penshurst. The flood modelling has been completed and the design in being reviewed.


General Maintenance and Works:

Next week, the Parks & Gardens team will be removing weeds from the roundabout and medians. On Wednesday 29th November, the works will be carried out in Penshurst to clean and maintain the garden beds off the parking areas. Additionally, the street sweeper will also be there on the same day to assist in keeping the streets clean. The replacement of signage and cleaning has been completed.

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Southern Grampians Shire Small Town Strategy

WHAT IS THE SMALL TOWNS STRATEGY?

Over the last two decades Council has conducted extensive strategic planning work to guide the future growth and character of the region responding to the variety in size, infrastructure provision, history and community needs of each of the local towns surrounding Hamilton.

Accordingly, the specific strategic direction for each town, outlining a vision, existing assets, challenges, and a future plan for service and infrastructure delivery needs to be reviewed and updated.

The limitations in funding and resources available to Council means that creative approaches to service and infrastructure delivery are required.

Strategic thinking is necessary to determine how to best balance investment across the towns with projected growth and those experiencing population decline, while ensuring communities have fair access to the facilities and services necessary for liveability.

To do this, it is important to understand how each community uses the facilities in their town, what they need and value, and how/where they access services not available locally.

The vision for each town outlined in this Small Towns Strategy will enable each of our towns to complement and support one another to provide the services, infrastructure and opportunities necessary to ensure the wellbeing of the Shire's residents for years to come.

NEXT STEPS?

The project team is now pleased to exhibit this draft Small Towns Strategy to the community for a final engagement period.

Feedback on the document and on township priorities can be sent through to planning @sthgrampains.vic.gov.au.

All feedback received will be considered by Council prior to adoption of the Strategy early next year.

Key items in Strategy

CONSIDERATIONS

Community Infrastructure and Services

- * The swimming pool in Penshurst is in poor condition, has low visitation and high operating costs.
- * Penshurst lacks community space.
- * The caravan park which adjoins the Recreation Reserve is of a low standard, with limited infrastructure and no on-site supervision.

Lifestyle and character

- * A high proportion of activity space in the town centre is apparently vacant.
- * The amenity of the streetscape requires improvement, especially Bell and Martin Streets.
- * The built form of the township better reflects historical uses and is poorly equipped to meet current needs.

Access, Connection and Transport

- * The Botanic Gardens lack shared paths infrastructure.
- * Broad an ongoing road renewal is needed roads are not fit for purpose as they are based on decades old traffic and freight patterns.
- * Public transport access is limited.

Infrastructure (servicing)

* The most densely populated settlement without reticulated sewerage. This poses significant risk to human and environmental health.

Natural Values and Open Space

- * FFG are located around the township boundary within a kilometre of the town, including Bandicoots, Readers Daisy, Australasian Shoveler, and Magpie Geese, among others.
- * The lack of sewerage infrastructure has resulted in high levels of blue-green algae in the spring located within the Botanic Gardens, and poses a high risk of contamination of local rivers, wetlands and waterways.
- * Some facilities in the Botanic Gardens require upgrades.
- * The groundwater aquifers underlying the town are currently undervalued.

OPPORTUNITIES

The following list of opportunities was developed to reflect previous strategic work and community engagement results.

Community Infrastructure and Services

- * Investigate repurposing of swimming pool into a splash park or neighbourhood hub.
- * Investigate value or delivering a neighbourhood hub to Penshurst.
- * Provide support to schools and kindergarten.

Lifestyle and character

- * Better leverage Penshurst's location on the Great Southern Touring Route.
- * Maximise increased tourism opportunities generated by delivery of Penshurst Volcanoes Discovery Centre.
- * Seek funding to undertake a streetscape revitalisation project, involving improvements to building facades and street tree plantings. Investigate how to better utilise vacant heritage buildings.

Access, Connection and Transport

- * Advocate to Department of Transport for broad and ongoing road renewal.
- * Continue to advocate to Department of Transport to improve bus service.
- * Explore potential to purchase a community bus and local school bus.
- * Improve shared paths and active transport connectivity. Create a walking and cycling loop that connects the Botanic Gardens.
- * Improve the walking track to Mount Rouse and Yatmerone Wildlife Reserve.
- *Deliver signage and bicycle parking facilities in Botanic Gardens.

Infrastructure (servicing)

* Finalise funding model for Penshurst adaptive wastewater scheme, to be delivered with Wannon Water.

Natural Values and Open Space

* Investigate the groundwater aquifers underlying Penshurst and surrounds and identify environmental, indigenous and cultural significance and the interconnection with the Mt Rouse volcano and nearby Wetlands include Yatmerone.

Key Aspects to be Updated in Strategic Planning Documentation

- * Require land owners to provide own infrastructure to provide water access in less concentrated urban areas as part of building permit, e.g. 10000L water tank with fitting for fire truck. Triggers in planning system needed.
- * Penshurst is a good candidate town for consideration of rural living, especially with its support services (schools, local retail, quality open space, WDHS health centre etc).
- * Vision of community infrastructure needs.
- * Investigation areas for rural living/residential development and logical zone changes around existing townships in map form.

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Caramut and District Garden Club

Rhododendron are spectacular plants of around 800 evergreen semi-deciduous and deciduous shrubs and trees. Found in many areas of the world, there is even one found in the northeast of Australia. Azaleas also belong to the rhododendron family. They are grown mainly for their massed display of flowers which vary greatly in size from tiny thimbles to 20cm trumpets. They can be one coloured or be multi coloured. Now is a good time to take a walk around the streets to see them out in all their glory. The photo is of mine which was in the garden when we bought our home in Hamilton nearly 20 years ago.

Rhododendrons need loose, open, well drained, acidic soil with plenty of humus to retain moisture. They thrive with regular mulching that enables their predominantly surface roots to spread and develop. They prefer dappled shade or at least protection from the hottest afternoon sun and strong winds. Mine gets no real attention and only a little watering during prolonged dry periods but does meet the growing conditions.

Epsom Salts

I discovered a number of garden uses for Epsom salts. Obviously from America. I haven't tried the hints. Over the next few articles, I will include the suggested hints.

Fancy full ferns. When ferns are yellow and dull-looking, they don't look great. Epsom salt helps ferns and plants similar to ferns, such as elephant ear, have rich, dark foliage. Add 1 tablespoon (15 ml) of Epsom salt to a gallon (3.8 litres) of water and spray ferns and elephant ears to achieve the look.

Increase nutrient uptake: Epsom salts, when added to the soil around plants, helps them absorb other nutrients more efficiently. In fact, most commercial fertilizers have large amounts of magnesium. By adding plain Epsom salts, you won't have to bother with so much fertilizer.

HELP SHAPE THE 2024-25 COUNCIL BUDGET

Southern Grampians Shire Council is changing the way it engages with the community in relation to the preparation of the annual budget. This year, Council will shift to a single engagement period prior to the preparation of the budget, seeking submissions from the community beginning in November.

This earlier engagement process will allow Council to be better informed of residents' priorities within the context of the Council Plan 2021-2025, prior to the development of the budget. Residents can participate in the budget engagement process by filling out the online submission form or completing a paper-based form available at our Brown Street customer service centre.

The new engagement process will also allow the 2024/25 Annual Budget to be considered by Council for adoption in May 2024 — a month earlier than in previous years. Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Cr David Robertson encouraged community members to get involved in this process to share what they felt was important to them and their families. "Whether you're a ratepayer or a regular user of council services, the budget and how Council prioritises its spending affects everyone," Cr Robertson said. "From children and family services to libraries, roads and footpaths to waste collection, it's important that the budget reflects the priorities of residents. While there are no guarantees that submissions will be included in the budget, all will be considered and assessed against their alignment to our Council Plan 2021-25," Cr Robertson said.

The online submission form is live now and can be accessed here. Submissions close Friday 1 December at 5pm. The form is available on Council's website at www.sthgrampians.vic.gov.au/haveyoursay Council is also conducting a short survey about the budget and long-term financial plan, available here.

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A PAGE TO SHARE RECIPES French Onion Christmas Tree Dip

Prep Time 45mins Serves 12

INGREDIENTS

- · 1kg cream cheese, softened
- · 40g sachet French onion soup mix
- · 1 cup grated tasty cheese
- · 1/3 cup finely grated parmesan
- · 1/3 cup chopped sun-dried tomatoes in oil
- · 1 bunch fresh flat-leaf parsley leaves, chopped
- · 6 x 25g packets mini Ritz crackers
- · 1 cup almond kernels
- · 150g jar red cocktail onions, drained, halved
- · 80g packet pretzel sticks
- · 1 slice tasty cheese
- · Assorted crackers, to serve
- · Vegetables, to serve

METHOD

· Step 1

Using an electric mixer, beat cream cheese until light and fluffy. Add soup mix. Beat until well combined. Add grated cheeses and tomato. Season with pepper. Beat until well combined. Cover. Refrigerate for 1 hour or until firm enough to shape.

· Step 2

Place a large piece of plastic wrap on a flat surface. Turn cheese mixture onto plastic. Using clean hands and plastic wrap, form mixture into a tree shape (base of tree will need to be 15cm in diameter). Place on a serving platter.

· Step 3

Press parsley all over cheese. Brush excess parsley from platter. Open 4 packets of crackers. Using picture as a guide, decorate tree with almonds, onion, Ritz crackers and ¾ of the pretzels. Using a 4cm star-shaped cutter, cut a star from cheese slice. Carefully push into top of tree. Serve with remaining pretzel sticks, assorted crackers and vegetables.





Baked Parmesan Zucchini



STEP 1: Preheat the oven to 450°F (230°C) OR to 400°F (200°C) with a fan setting (convection). Move the rack one shelf above the centre. Wash the zucchini and dry with paper towels. Cut into thick, at least 1/2 inch (1 1/4 cm) slices.

STEP 2: Place on a baking sheet (don't line it with parchment paper), drizzle with olive oil and season with salt and pepper. Toss to coat. Spread the slices as much as you can.

STEP 3: Sprinkle zucchini with garlic powder and basil.

STEP 4: Sprinkle zucchini slices with grated parmesan and pecorino cheese.

STEP 5: Bake for 9 minutes then turn on the grill setting and bake for a further 2-3 minutes or until cheese is golden in colour. Keep an eye on the zucchini so it won't burn (easy is such a hot oven). Baking time may vary depending on the thickness of the zucchini slices and on the oven (every oven bakes differently).

How to build a scarecrow

Kids page

Tools + Materials

- twine
- hammer
- nails
- scissors
- straw or dried grass
- old clothes
- Pillowcase
- boots
- (2) 1x2 1.8m garden

stakes

1. Set Up the Scarecrow Frame

Start by buttoning all but the top four buttons of the scarecrow's shirt, and then inserting a 1.8m stake through both of the shirt sleeves, making sure it's centered evenly through the shirt. This stake will act as your horizontal support.

Lay the horizontal stake at a 90-degree angle over the vertical stake that you'll later drive into the ground, and about 30cm from the end of the vertical stake (you'll later use that length to support the scarecrow's head). Drive two nails into the wood and through the shirt where the pieces overlap. This will join the frame members together and clamp the shirt fabric between them.

Making sure the scarecrow's body faces the direction you want, carefully press the vertical stake into the ground. You may need to use a hammer to drive it firmly into place.

2. Create the Top Half

Using a small length of twine, tie off the bottom of the shirt at the waistline. Leave the top three or four buttons undone because you'll need access for stuffing. Tie both of the sleeves shut using pieces of garden twine. If you'd like to add gloves to your scarecrow, this is a good time to do that. Using handfuls of straw or dried grass, stuff the chest cavity of your scarecrow. Make sure that you stuff it enough to give it a good solid shape.



3. Create the Bottom Half

You'll need to stuff the pants before attaching them. Tie off both pant legs and firmly stuff the pants with whatever material you've chosen. To attach the pants, use twine to create a pair of suspenders for your scarecrow. We used the belt loops to secure the twine and brought it over the shoulders and secured the suspenders to the rear of the scarecrow. You'll want to stuff the legs into a pair of shoes or boots. If they're old boots you won't be reusing, drill a drainage hole in the bottom so they won't fill with water when it rains.



4. Add Finishing Touches



Use an old pillowcase to form the head of the scarecrow. Stuff it with filling and then pull it down over the top of the frame. Tie the neck to the vertical stake and begin forming the shape of the head. Add a face, some hair or even a hat to make your scarecrow look menacing enough to ward off any potential garden invaders.

Well, most of them, maybe. In this case (right) the scarecrow's lap became a warm and comfy place to nap.
