# DAVID O'BRIEN TO TOUR IRELAND WITH AUSTRALIAN AFL MASTERS TEAM

A former Penshurst footballer, David O'Brien, has been selected in an Australian AFL Masters over 50s side to tour Ireland next March.

David won a premiership with Penshurst seconds in 2003, along with brothers, Daniel, Peter and Matthew, and a second time with the reserves in 2016.

David, 53, has previously won selections in two Australian AFL Masters side - in 2017 playing in the over 45s in the midfield, and in 2022 in the over 50s in the back pocket.

But an international tour to Ireland takes his selection to a new level - one that delighted and surprised him.

"I was not the greatest footballer in my playing Pens days at Penshurst and many other clubs, but you could say the competition has thinned out a bit," he joked.

"I have always said that Aussie Rules football played at a local level, is a great game involving all walks of life and body shapes. If my selection encourages a few more western Victorians to take up Masters football, or keep another couple of reserves sides on the park each Saturday, then that's a great goal achieved.

"I am just happy to spread the word about the terrific benefits of AFL Masters for older footballers, both men and women. Hopefully my selection may inspire others to think that if David O'Brien can make a national team, perhaps I can too."

Joining the Masters over 50 team in Ireland will be a under 40s AFL Masters team as well as a women's team. The 11-day tour will include two tests and a social game. The Irish games will be played under international rules and the Australian coaching staff is led by former AFL superstar, Jason Akermanis, who will also play in the over 40s division. There is also a social game of Aussie Rules against the British national side at the end of the tour.

# Western Victorian Masters team in 2025?

David lives at Bellbrae near Torquay but still farms with his family as part of the Garrangreena Partnership north of Penshurst. He would like to see a Masters competition start in 2025 in the Western District.

"We have just formed a new Masters club "South Coast Sharks' in the Surf Coast area and we have applied to enter the Victorian Country League next year.

"A few of us are looking to start a Western Victorian club as well - maybe based at Penshurst - to try and enter the competition in 2025. We will be trying to host a trial (non contact) game next June or

July on a Sunday at Penshurst.

"Interested players from the Hamilton, Warrnambool or Mininera areas can contact myself, Tony Lovell or Wayne Loader (Ballarat Masters), Brent Ali (Vic Country Masters president) or Leigh Uebergang (Penshurst legend) who will likely captain the West Vic side for the day."

"Ultimately if a club or clubs are formed, they can determine the location of the ground, name and jumpers and whether to play contact or non-contact Masters footy," David added.

He suggested the trail game at Penshurst in Winter because of personal knowledge of the ground. "It will be very soft in June or July and that certainly helps us older footballers," he laughed.

David has had to increase his sprints and endurance work and watch his diet and alcohol intake because competition to play in the two Tests will be fierce - 13 of the 21 players in the Masters 50s have won at least three All Australians honours. And there is only 15 players in a team.

"Although mainly a back pocket, I have played in all positions, including midfield, ruck and forward, over 45 years. I am happy to play anywhere the coaching staff decide," he added.

"There is also a goalie position in International rules, but at the moment I am getting my running and endurance skills up."

### Adjusting to International rules

International rules is a combination of Aussie Rules and Gaelic football. Not leaving any stone unturned, David has already played Gaelic football with a Geelong league side, Western Bullcalves, who were Grand Finalists in the local Geelong Gaelic league this year.

Both sides think the other has an advantage - the Aussies thinks international football is more Gaelic football orientated, while the Irish think it favours Aussie Rules.

David explains: "Like many compromises, both sides have to give and take a bit. We get marking, easier ground ball pick-ups (not using your feet) and Aussie Rules tackling which they don't have in Gaelic football.

"The Irish get the round Gaelic ball, soccer goals, and 'soloing' which we don't have. We also get behinds for a missed shot which may come in handy in my case," David said.

"I have played Gaelic football and it's a fast running game with the bumping and dispossession skills of Aussie Rules. I encourage both men and women to get in touch with their local Gaelic teams. The Irish are fast and hard to tackle, especially when they "solo".

### Veteran of 400 games plus

Although only 53, David has been playing Aussie Rules for an incredible 45 years. He went to Monash University and played about 180 games for Monash Whites, winning a flag in 1998 and being awarded life membership. He estimates he has played around another 180 games with the Penshurst Football Netball Club, winning reserve flags in 2003 and 2016. He also won best and fairest in 2003.

He also played 45 games for Angelsea Football Netball Club and currently has played AFL Masters football for about 10 years for Moorabool Valley Crocs in the Vic

Maybe, just maybe, through the tortuous and joyous life that is about to unfold, a new world, a better world may become a reality, especially when we admit that we have not left this world the place we had hoped for.

What is it about the face of a new born child?

That as parents we glimpse something of ourselves. Through this infant, we shall leave a tiny imprint on this planet, All is not lost. Part of us, if only through our DNA, will live on even after we have drawn our last breath, just as surely as this child has taken their first breath. In that first moment when Mother sees the face of her child, a threshold is crossed and we can never go back to the way it was. You can't put a child back into the womb and somehow reverse a birth. And when we see that face we are changed. Even our language is different. You see it yourselves and you've probably done it yourselves. In the googly mess of exploding waves of joy, child speak is the only language that is appropriate. We are made children again. Gibbering idiots, wanting to reclaim our innocence and naivety. We know that as a child we can trust and love and skip and giggle and burble. 'Unless you turn and become like little children.'

'Dooga dooga Dooo' becomes our new / old mantra.


Country league, and six years playing for Geelong AFL Masters in the Metro league. Add on two years playing Gaelic footy and about eight years playing non-contact footy with the Surf Coast AMC on a Tuesday night and it's quite clear how much he loves his footy.

David readily admits he's never been a great kick but enjoys the physical side of footy.

"I didn't learn to kick properly until around 2005 at Penshurst when Mick Ross started to correct my ball drop at training! I have always enjoyed the bumping and tackling side of Aussie Rules and some would say the Masters is a league full of back pocket players who enjoy the physical side of football.

"But somehow I have made the Aussie over 50s team so it's never too late for the more talented Western Victorian footballers to put the boots back on and get out for at least one more kick of the leather."

# RARE AND ICONIC ARTWORKS BY BAROQUE MASTERS UNVEILED TOGETHER IN WORLD PREMIERE EXHIBITION

Hamilton Gallery today unveils the world premiere exhibition Emerging From Darkness: Faith, Emotion and The Body in the Baroque, presenting over 70 important works by world-renowned baroque masters, including several never-before-seen in Australia.

Drawn from the partnership with the National Gallery of Victoria (NGV), as well as loans from the National Gallery of Australia (NGA) and private lenders from across the country, Emerging from Darkness will showcase rare and iconic works by the world's most significant baroque artists including Artemisia Gentileschi, Peter Paul Rubens, Bartolomeo Manfredi, Guercino, Lavinia Fontana, Sofonisba Anguissola and Valentin de Boulogne. This collection of historical

pieces, displayed together for the first time, will be exhibited alongside works by contemporary artists, Robyn Stacey and Angela Tiatia, who are active in the baroque style today.

One of the most ambitious exhibitions ever held in regional Australia, Emerging from Darkness explores the international movement that changed the course of art at the beginning of the 17th Century, unveiling new insights into the artists and how Baroque continues to influence contemporary art. The exhibition has been curated by Laurie Benson, Curator of International Art, NGV, Dr David Marshall, Assoc. Prof., University of Melbourne Culture & Communications, Dr Lisa Beaven, Senior Research Fellow, La Trobe University and Ian Brilley, Exhibitions and Collections Coordinator, Hamilton Gallery.

Highlights of the show include several paintings by 17th Century female artists who cathartically reinterpret experiences of violence and turmoil while simultaneously voicing strong, feminist messages of empowerment. Featured among these is the Lucretia (1630-5, Italy) by Artemisia Gentileschi, presented to the public for the first time in Australia. On loan from the NGA is the Self-portrait (1623, Belgium) by Peter Paul Rubens. Arguably the most influential baroque artist working in Europe in the 17th Century and regarded as one of the greatest artists of all time, Rubens' masterpieces include religious and mythological paintings, royal portraits, eroticism, evocative landscapes and brutal battles scenes. Featured among the loans from the NGV is The Martyrdom of St Lawrence by Spanish painter Jusepe de Ribera, whose unfettered naturalistic approach epitomises how baroque artists treated Christian art.

Emerging From Darkness is a once in a lifetime opportunity for local residents and visitors to the Southern Grampians region to experience these and many other world-renowned baroque works, supported by the Victoria Government's Regional Events Fund through Visit Victoria.

Minister for Tourism, Sport and Major Events, Steve Dimopoulos, says, "We're proud to support



# **Passionfruit Charlotte**

Prep Time 45mins Serves 12

# **INGREDIENTS**

From Taste.com.au

2 x 9g packet Jelly Mango Passionfruit jelly crystals 250ml (1 cup) boiling water 300g packet savoiardi (sponge finger biscuits) 750ml (3 cups) thickened cream 180g (2/3 cup) passionfruit curd Passionfruit pulp, to serve

# METHOD

· Step 1

Place the jelly crystals in a heatproof bowl. Pour over boiling water. Stir until dissolved. Set aside,

stirring occasionally, for 5 minutes or until cooled slightly. Place in the fridge for 1 hour or until chilled but not set.

· Step 2

Meanwhile, line the base of a 7cm-deep, 20cm (base size) springform pan with baking paper. Trim 14 biscuits to 7cm lengths (reserve offcuts). Arrange upright around the side of prepared pan. Arrange remaining biscuits and reserved offcuts over the base of the pan.



· Step 3

Use electric beaters to beat 375ml (1 1/2 cups) cream in a large bowl until soft peaks form. Gradually add the jelly mixture, beating constantly, until firm peaks form (do not overbeat).

· Step 4

Spread half the cream mixture over the biscuit base. Top with half the passionfruit curd. Use a skewer to create a swirled effect. Top with remaining cream mixture. Place in the fridge for 6 hours or overnight until set.

· Step 5

Use electric beaters to beat the remaining cream in a bowl until firm peaks form. Use a large metal spoon to fold the remaining curd into the cream until just combined. Top the cheese-cake with the curd mixture then drizzle over the passionfruit pulp.






