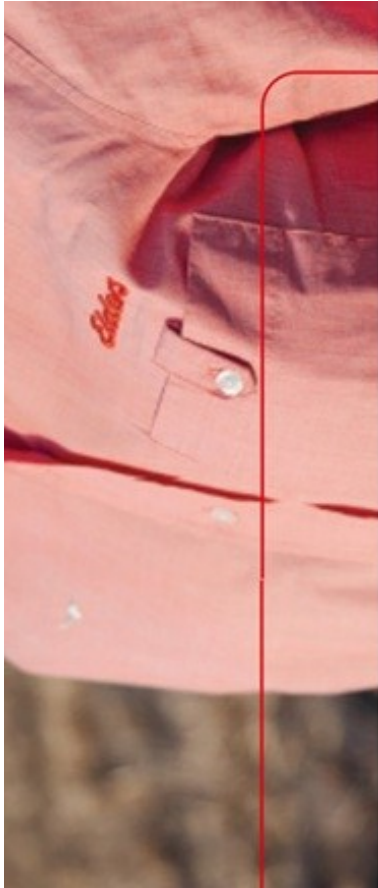

YOUR COMMUNITY****COUNCIL MAKES WASTE SERVICES MORE ACCESSIBLE FOR ALL RESIDENTS**

Southern Grampians Shire Council acknowledges there are a number of properties within the Shire that do not have access to kerbside waste collection services.

From 1 September, two new initiatives will roll out across the Shire, providing more flexibility, better value, and greater access to essential waste and recycling services.

The first program - the new **Out of Zone Combined Two Bin Service** will give residents the ability to manage their household waste and recycling affordably and conveniently.

Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Dennis Heslin said this program gives households outside the kerbside collection zone the same value and access as those on a regular kerbside service, with the added bonus of double the general waste capacity.

"This service offers a fair, flexible and affordable option for managing household waste and recycling for all residents," Cr Heslin said.

Here's how it works:

Residents outside the town kerbside collection zone will be able to pre-purchase credits to the value of \$430 which includes:

26 x 240 litre equivalent recycling drop-offs

104 x 120 litre equivalent waste drop-offs

The new drop-off service will be available at any transfer station within the shire and credits are valid for 12 months, expiring **31 August 2026**.

Sign up online <https://www.sthgrampians.vic.gov.au/Our-Services/Waste-Recycling>

or visit Brown Street Customer Service. You'll receive an electronic or physical card to present your card on arrival at any transfer station. Credits will be removed at each visit.

"Whether you're clearing out recyclables or tackling regular household rubbish, this flexible service is designed to work around your schedule and location," Cr Heslin said.

Extra Help for Green Waste Disposal

We're also giving all Southern Grampians ratepayers a hand in keeping their gardens trimmed and tidy. As part of our ongoing waste reduction efforts, Council will introduce a **Green Waste Voucher Program** to help households responsibly dispose of garden clippings and organic material.

"This program will be in addition to the kerbside FOGO collection service and will allow all households two free green waste drop-offs at any transfer station within the shire," Cr Heslin said.

"Each voucher covers up to one cubic metre or a small trailer load, there will be a limit of one voucher per visit with vouchers expiring 31 August 2026."

To redeem the vouchers, simply present your rates notice or assessment number at the transfer station of your choice.

Council is pleased to offer these initiatives as part of our broader sustainability goals and our commitment to making waste services easier and more affordable for all residents across the region.

"These programs are designed to remove barriers, reduce costs and support residents in doing the right thing for their homes and the environment by ensuring no one in our community misses out on access to essential waste services," Cr Heslin Concluded.

COMMUNITY SATISFACTION SURVEY REFLECTS CHALLENGES & OPPORTUNITIES AHEAD

The results of the 2025 Local Government Community Satisfaction Survey are in, offering a snapshot of Council's performance over the past year and providing valuable insights into community perceptions of Southern Grampians Shire Council's services.

Conducted independently by JWS Research on behalf of the Victorian Government, the annual survey captures the views of residents across key areas. As part of their methodology, JWS interview 400 people to gather the necessary data. This year, around 2100 people in the Shire were contacted in order to complete the required 400 interviews. This year's results reflect a stable performance overall, with some notable advancements and identified areas for future improvement.

Council marked the biggest improvement in overall direction, up six points from 2024. Other areas showing modest improvements included consultation and engagement up three points from last year, sealed local roads up three points, value for money up two points and community decisions up one point from 2024. Remaining unchanged from the 2024 scores were waste management 59 and overall performance 44, with the only declining score being customer service dropping two points to 58.

Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Dennis Heslin said while it was pleasing to see most results steadily improving from previous years lows, Council acknowledges there is a long way to go to increase the scores to the State-wide averages.

"This has been a very big year for Council which has given us all some very distinct highs and lows with bushfires, droughts and the completion and progression of large milestone projects," said Cr Heslin.

"Given the challenges faced within our community, the fact that the overall performance ratings have held steady with Council direction moving upwards is encouraging. Council have worked hard to be transparent and more accessible to the community we represent which is a desire we've heard loud and clear from residents."

"What's most clear to us from the survey, is that significant work is required for us to meet the expectations and hopes of our community," said Cr Heslin. "We're not shying away from the fact that we have a long way to go before we see the results we want to see, with the Southern Grampians near the State-wide average and above the Large Rural average. However, we can take from the responses that we are on the right path and moving in the right direction.

A number of measures have been implemented over the last 12 months to improve customer service, transparency, service levels and communication. A new customer service charter outlines response timeframes and expectations for the community, and condition assessments across roads, footpaths, buildings, and playgrounds are guiding long-term capital works and maintenance.

Following a period of community engagement, the updated Road Management Plan sets clearer service and intervention levels. From September, Council will offer waste collection to previously unserved properties and has strengthened project communications. A new business facilitation officer is also on hand to help local businesses navigate permit processes and get up and running sooner.

"We want the community to know that we are committed to doing more to see Continued page 12

Slow Cooked Beef & Beans

Prep Time 15 mins Cook 7 hour Serves 6

INGREDIENTS

2 leeks, pale section only, coarsely chopped	1 cup (250ml) beef stock
2 carrots, peeled, coarsely chopped	400g can cherry tomatoes
350g swede or gold sweet potato	2 tbsp baby capers, chopped
3 garlic cloves, chopped	4 anchovy fillets, chopped
1.2kg Gravy Beef or Slow Cook Beef Brisket	2 zucchini, coarsely chopped
	400g can borlotti beans, rinsed, drained

Step 1 - Place the leek, carrot, swede or sweet potato and garlic in a slow cooker. Add the beef, stock, tomatoes, capers and anchovy. Cover and cook for 4 hours on high (or 6 hours on low) or until the mixture thickens slightly.

Step 2 - Add the zucchini and beans to the beef mixture in the slow cooker. Cover and cook for 1 hour on high. Reduce heat to low and cook for a further 1-2 hours or until the beef is very tender. Season.

Step 3 - Transfer the beef to a heatproof bowl. Use 2 forks to coarsely shred the beef. Return to the slow cooker and stir to combine.

Step 4 - Divide the beef mixture among serving bowls.

***Air fryer crumpet garlic bread***

Prep 10 mins Cook 8 mins Serves 4

150g salted butter, at room temperature	1 tsp sea salt flakes
1/4 cup finely chopped fresh continental parsley	300g pkt crumpets, halved
4 garlic cloves, crushed	100g (1 cup) pre-grated 3 cheese blend

Step 1 - Combine butter, parsley, garlic and salt in a bowl. Spread generous teaspoonfuls over each crumpet half. Scatter a generous pinch of cheese over half of the crumpet halves.

Step 2 - Arrange remaining crumpet halves over the cheese to make half-moon crumpet sandwiches. Transfer sandwiches, cut side down, to an air fryer basket lined with foil. Sprinkle over remaining cheese.

Step 3 - Air fry for 8 minutes at 180C until golden and cheese is melted.

COUNCIL RELEASES COUNCIL PLAN FOR COMMUNITY EXHIBITION

Southern Grampians Shire Council is calling for feedback on the draft Council Plan 2025-2029 following last night's ordinary Council meeting. The 2025-2029 Council Plan, which will serve as Council's key guiding document to shape priorities, services and investment across the Shire, was developed through extensive community engagement with Southern Grampians Shire residents. Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Dennis Heslin said the Council plan establishes Council's objectives for the next four years and will have a major role in guiding Council's Budgets and other activities.

“Council has undertaken widespread engagement to refresh the Community Vision and prepare a new Council Plan,” Cr Heslin said.

“There was a fantastic response from the community. Over 600 residents came to ten township engagement sessions or visited our Hamilton CBD shopfront throughout February and March and another 90 filled in an online survey,” said Cr Heslin.

“Young people, businesses, and townships have helped to set a clear direction for the future of the region by highlighting the areas that residents see are the most important to maintaining and improving the Southern Grampians.”

For the first time, the Council Plan brings together four important frameworks, the Community Vision, the Council Plan, the Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Plan, and the Disability Action Plan, into one unified strategy to better achieve positive community outcomes.

The key pillars for focus include Social and Community; Business, Economy and Tourism; Community Infrastructure and Assets; Environment; and Leadership and Government. Across each of these pillars, Council has embedded strategic objectives, guided by feedback from the community, as well as indicators which will help us measure progress across the four years of the plan.

“The community have told us they're eager to see focus on issues such as roads, staying active and connected, tourism, youth, business and population growth, as well as communication and engagement. The Community Vision has been reviewed to reflect these sentiments, while the Council Plan also includes strategies in these areas.”

Cr Heslin encouraged the community to read the plan and have their say.

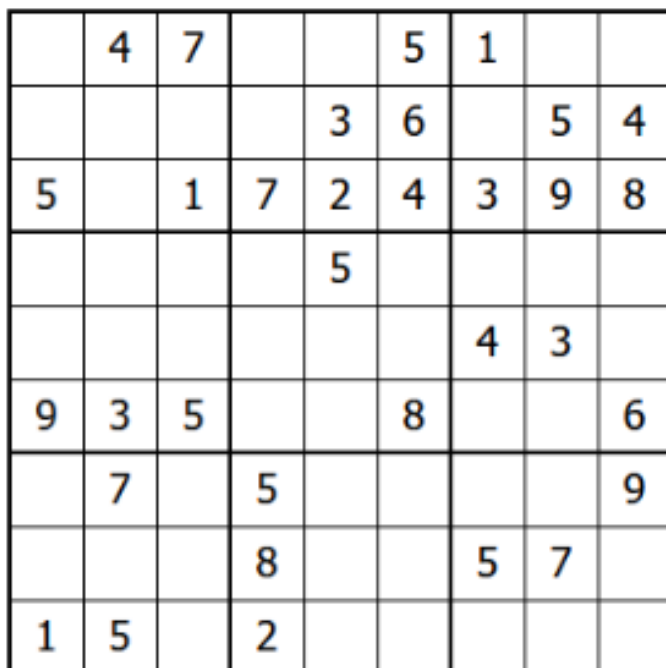
“We've done the consultation, reviewed the input received and now we want to make sure we have heard you properly. Have we missed anything? Is there anything you feel strongly about that hasn't been included? Let us know,” concluded Cr Heslin.

The document can be viewed and feedback provided on the Council website in the 'engage with us' section, at the Council customer services desk in Brown Street Hamilton, at The Hamilton Library and at the Market Place customer services desk. The document will be open for feedback until 27 August 2025.

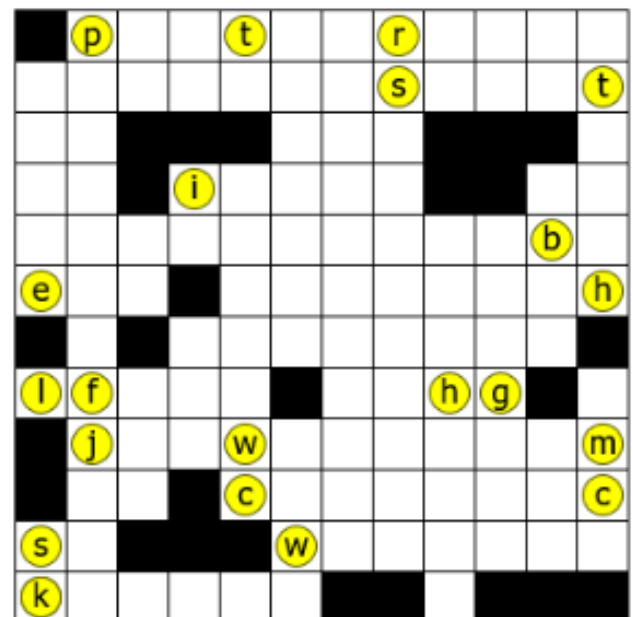

YOUR COMMUNITY****COUNCIL ADOPTS NEW ROAD MANAGEMENT PLAN**

Southern Grampians Shire Council resolved to adopt the Road Management Plan (RMP) 2025 - 2029 at the August ordinary Council meeting.

Every four years, Council is required under the Road Management Act 2004 to review its RMP – the blueprint for how it inspects, maintains and prioritises local roads and footpaths. The Plan outlines Council's approach to road inspections, maintenance response times, intervention thresholds, and asset management practices to ensure a safe, affordable, and sustainable local road network.

Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Dennis Heslin said the plan has been developed following a review of the RMP 2021-2025 and community engagement.

"Three targeted engagement sessions were held in bushfire affected communities along with three community drop-in sessions held in Hamilton, Coleraine and Dunkeld and an online consultation portal was available for feedback," Cr Heslin said.

The key themes captured through the community engagement include:

Road Maintenance - grading schedules, vegetation, drainage and other defects

Administration - understanding road ownership (Council or State) and how to report issues

Funding - budget priorities and potential funding sources

Application of the RMP - construction standards, fire access, heavy vehicle use and intervention times

Some of the key changes in the new RMP plan include the Road and Footpath Hierarchy - ensuring categorisation better reflects community needs and usage.

Road and footpath inspection frequencies and intervention levels have been adjusted for more consistency with risk and use, and better clarification and understanding of council's responsibilities within the road reserve. "Thank you to everyone who came along to our sessions, asked questions, shared ideas and challenged us to think differently. Your feedback has helped us fine-tune the plan, so it works for our communities now and into the future," Cr Heslin concluded.

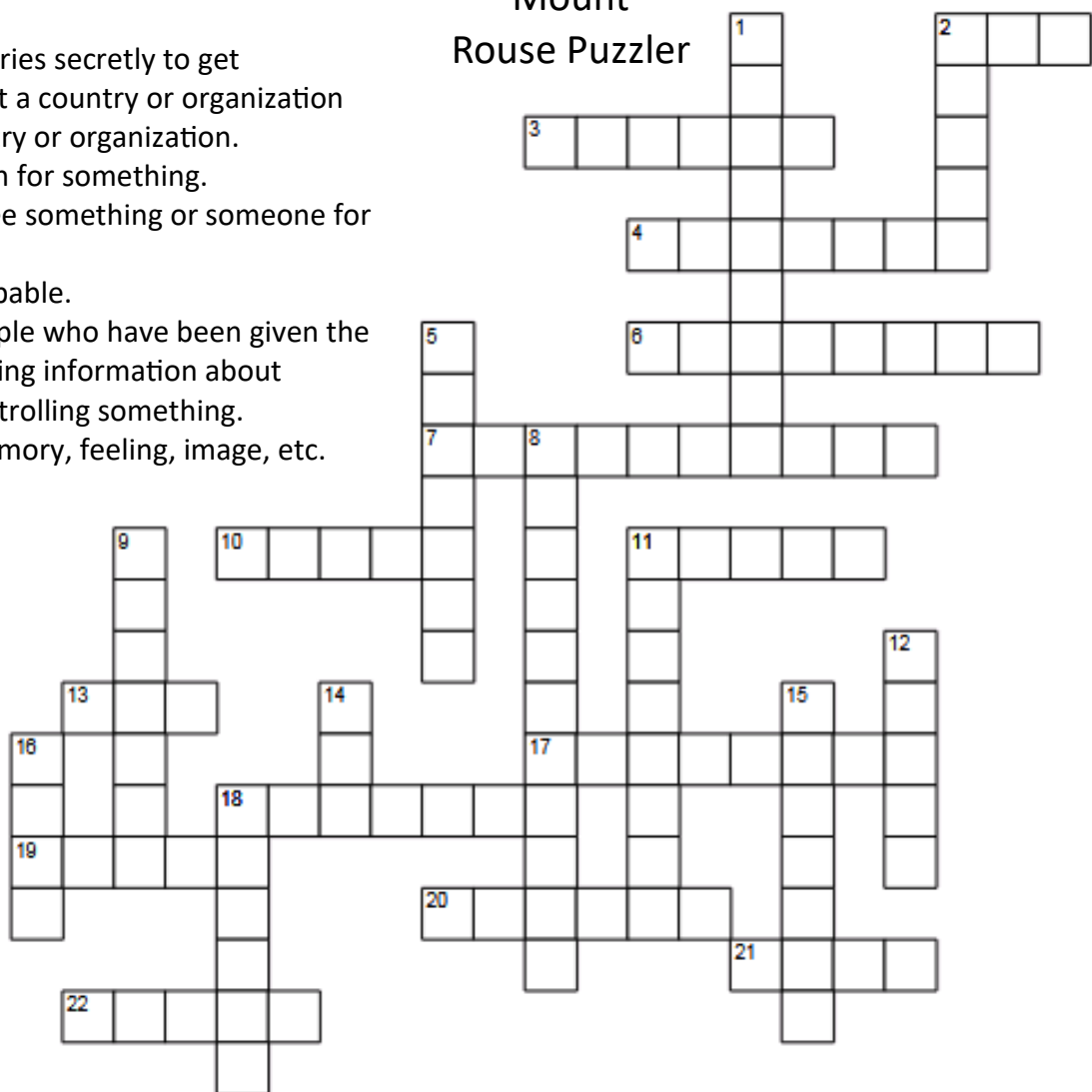
