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YEAR OF THE BIG SUN - 1914/1915

Our local district diarist Keith Cameron (pictured right) of Greenwood, wrote: "Drought very bad, worst since Grandpa was a little boy, good hay very scarce." Keith was working as a boundary rider for J.S. Ross of North Gums and recorded the ongoing dry."

In 1913 rainfall in western Victoria was well below average for the normally wet April- July period. As the Victorian Meteorological Bureau (the Met) records: Timely rain in early Spring then saved the wheat crop and raised prospects. However there was to be no such respite the following year. Southern Victoria started off very hot, suffering from widespread bushfires in February and March.



Good rains fell over most of Eastern Australia in March April 1914 but extremely dry conditions then set in over most of the southern half of the country.

The Penshurst Free Press of 4 July 1914, reported that the long dry spell is causing uneasiness amongst the farmers whose dams are not yet full...in September, to make things worse, a plague of caterpillars descended on the district, doing great damage on the Gums and Blackwood Estates ... the caterpillars appeared to be increasing in numbers and if the present weather conditions continue much longer it will be a sad outlook for the whole district.

The Free Press also noted that grass is very short and the ground in most places is as hard as mid summer. The frosts have caused the grass on the sides of hills to wither and have had a trying effect on young trees and potato crops.

Except in coastal NSW, drought became widespread and severe from July to October. Across large areas of the southern states the period May through October 1914 remains the driest such period on record.

Locally, conditions only worsened as the weather heated up in October and the hot dusty days had disheartening effect through out the district. The price of horse feed rose alarmingly.

Tom Johnson (Stock & Land Columnist, Diary of a Farmer) wrote that the Year of the Big Sun began well in the Western District but ended up with an almost rainless Spring and there was no grass until the following May. I was then very young however I don't think I'll forget the starving animals - the dead and dying sheep, cattle and horses. Tom's family was farming at Laanecoorie in the Bendigo district.

According to the Met rain in the eastern states in November and December did replenish farm dams and generated some grass growth, but dry weather returned early in 1915 to most eastern areas. It was not until April 1915 that the drought began to break in

most of Victoria and for NSW, May. Even then the May rain was too late for strong pasture growth because of cold weather.

Keith's observations provide an insight into the daily tasks undertaken during the big dry. The following have been taken from his 1915 diary entries:

"Jan. 6 Cold showery weather, stock all tucked up.

Mare Kitty died in No 5 (paddock)

25 No 5 pulling necks ("rabbitting")

26 Putting netting around stables to stop rabbits there is a power of them about the buildings

28 Got 27 rabbits out of the woodheap (north Gums)

Cycled to Hawkesdale

Feb 1. Took 62 lbs of rabbit skins to Colin (brother)

Jim McNiece pulled up pump in No1 mill

Warracknabeal horses have fallen away terribly of late

Pulled a cow out of the creek (cleaning out dams)

15 Robin (brother) started work for Leslie Murray (Burnbrae)

23 Dave (horse) in the creek (Mustons)

20 Very cold - hard on the stock.

22 4 dams are nearly dry, too boggy for sheep.

30 Very cold again, the poor stock do feel it.

31 Shot my horse McKie bogged in the No 17 creek (paddock)

Apr 6 Drafting the worst sheep off to feed

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The openings and closings we call 'funerals.'

Even after 40 years, I still regard it as a poignant privilege to attend a funeral. Perhaps more so now that my own funeral draws ever closer. Frequently I'm the person up the front trying to make sure that it all goes smoothly, but at the same time not drawing attention to myself. It's not about me. It has never been about me.

Someone popped up once in the back row of the funeral who I didn't know. We got chatting at the wake over a couple of frothies and some sausage rolls.

In his own words he had come for 'closure' and what lay behind his comment I take to my own funeral and grave.

But he was right. Funerals are about closure. What is past and gone must now be commended to the past and gone. We may not forget about the person but we can never get them back again no matter how much we might ache to.

Funerals are also about opening. We are invited to a different, new, wonky, rocky pathway. One which, if we are honest, we would rather not have to stumble along. But we have no choice and pained and grumpy as we might be, this long and tortuous path is the one we must tread. Some of us are crazy enough to believe that the one we think we have left behind, often walks with us. Encourages us, maybe even weeps with us and always cheers us on. For them too something has changed. There is closure on their past life but what if in dying to this world they live refreshed, liberated and renewed in another dimension where the distance between them and us is disconcertingly thin. Closure and opening coexist in the same place and at the same time.

My misspent college days

My college years were heady days of lectures, wine, song and prayer. We wrote essays, or tried and we used to have these things called tutorials. A hapless student would be asked to prepare a paper and the others would savagely tear it to pieces, arguing the toss and pointing out the flaws in the logic. I think today we would call it a healthy, robust debate but at the time it seemed cruel to those who were of a more sensitive nature. We spent a lot of time trying to figure out the theological niceties of the divine and proving that somehow we were the gatekeepers and guardians of the impeachable truth.

It was not until I heard a line from a colleague some 40+ years later that I began to see things from a much healthier perspective. My friend said something like this.

'What if, it is *not* about what we think about God on any given day, but rather it *is* about what God thinks of us each and every day. Maybe if I had heard those words, grasped them, clutched them to myself and integrated them into my soul, the last few decades may not have been so tortuous. For the truth that I have come to understand, nearly too late is that I can argue the toss and ponder and panic about the unfathomable God, but my energy would be more fruitfully expended in just allowing the delicious reality that the Master adores me and wants to continue to engage with me, even when and especially, when I have been at my most ghastly and shabbiest.

It is *not* about what I think of God on any given day. It IS about what God thinks about me (and you) each and every day.



WORKING TOGETHER TO KEEP OUR COMMUNITY SAFE THIS FIRE SEASON

As the warmer months approach, Southern Grampians Shire Council is encouraging all residents to start preparing their properties ahead of the upcoming Fire Danger Period.

Over the coming weeks, Council's Fire Prevention Officers will begin inspecting properties across the Shire to identify potential fire hazards. These inspections are a key part of keeping our community safe and reducing the risk of bushfires this summer.

Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Dennis Heslin said if a property is identified as needing hazard reduction work, the owner will receive a Fire Prevention Notice.

"If you receive a Fire Prevention Notice, it will outline required hazard reduction work with the due date, helping to improve the safety of your property and the community."

"To help residents get their properties fire ready, Council is offering free green waste drop-off at all its Transfer Stations from Monday 3 November to Sunday 9 November.

"This is a great opportunity to remove fine fuels such as long grass, leaves and loose bark from around your home".

Conditions apply for the free green waste drop off:

- Limit of 2m3 per customer, per day
- Only green waste and small tree branches will be accepted, (nothing bigger than 200mm accepted)
- No stumps, treated timber or other garden waste e.g soil, fencing wire, plastic strapping
- Loads will be inspected on arrival and any contaminated loads will be rejected
- Commercial loads are not accepted for free under this arrangement

Now is the perfect time to get started on cleaning up your property, here are a few simple steps you can take today:

- Keep grass short and gardens tidy,
- Trim overhanging branches and clear away leaves, bark and twigs,
- Use your FOGO bin and take advantage of the weekly spring collection which continues until the end of November before returning to a fortnightly collection in December.

Acting now will help ensure you're ready when the CFA Fire Danger Period begins in the coming weeks.

Resources to help prepare properties for the upcoming Fire Danger Period can be found via the CFA website "How to Prepare Your Property | CFA (Country Fire Authority)".

If you fail to complete the required work by the due date, you run the risk of receiving an infringement notice for non-compliance, and your property compulsory cleared by a contractor.

"Fire prevention is not a one-time job - it's something we all need to stay on top of throughout the summer months.

By working together, we can reduce fire risk and help keep our community safe this season," concluded Cr Heslin.

COUNCIL ADOPTS 10-YEAR ASSET PLAN TO GUIDE FUTURE INVESTMENT

Southern Grampians Shire Council adopted its Asset Plan 2025–2035, setting a clear direction for how the Shire's infrastructure will be managed, maintained and renewed over the next decade. Developed in accordance with the Local Government Act 2020, the Plan outlines the condition, value and long-term needs of Council's roads, buildings, parks, drainage, bridges and other key community assets. It provides a transparent framework to ensure that future investment decisions are sustainable, data-driven and aligned with community priorities.

Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Cr Dennis Heslin called it a vital piece of Council's long-term planning framework.

"Our infrastructure is what allows us to make the most of our towns, from roads and footpaths to playgrounds, footy ovals and community centres," Cr Heslin said. "This Plan ensures we're managing those assets responsibly, planning for the future, and maintaining the high level of service and transparency our community expects."

The Asset Plan 2025–2035 aligns with Council's Community Vision, Council Plan 2025–2029, and Long -Term Financial Plan, ensuring a coordinated approach to planning and investment across all asset classes.

Community feedback played an important role in shaping the final document. The draft Plan was publicly exhibited between 19 September and 6 October 2025, with submissions helping to strengthen sections on playgrounds and sporting facilities and clarify the Plan's review cycle.

"We're grateful to everyone who took the time to provide feedback," Cr Heslin said. "Direct insight from the community helps us make sure our planning reflects local priorities and focuses on the assets that matter most."

In recent years, Council has strengthened its asset knowledge through detailed road and footpath assessments and an updated Road Management Plan, helping to ensure the right investment decisions are made at the right time.

"This Plan reflects the progress we've made in improving asset management and provides a strong foundation for the future," said Cr Heslin. "By maintaining up to date data and a long-term focus, we can make the best use of every dollar invested in community infrastructure."

COUNCIL ADOPTS UPDATED AQUATIC CHILD SUPERVISION POLICY TO STRENGTHEN COMMUNITY SAFETY

Southern Grampians Shire Council has adopted a new Child Supervision Policy for all Counciloperated outdoor swimming pools, highlighting its commitment to the safety of children, families and staff.

The updated policy, endorsed at the October Council Meeting, will take effect from the beginning of the 2025/26 Outdoor Pool Season. It replaces the Watch Around Water accreditation currently in place at outdoor pools, which will continue to apply at the Hamilton Indoor Leisure and Aquatic Centre (HILAC).

Southern Grampians Shire Council Mayor Dennis Heslin said the adoption of this policy enables a more efficient and effective response for all Council employed lifeguards, allowing Council to tailor the policy to meet service needs while ensuring the safety of all pool users and staff.

"The policy remains in alignment with the Guidelines for Safe Pool Operations (GSPO), which reference national industry standards that are enforced by state and local governments. It includes and extends on current Watch Around Water policies to provide increased clarity on facility entry for minors and education for large group entry."

The policy will remain unchanged for children five (5) years and under with no entry permitted without an appropriate parent or guardian (aged 16 or over) willing to swim with the child and remain within arm's reach.

Children aged 11 years and under will require active supervision by a parent or guardian while at the pool. This is an increase from the previous age limit of 10 years.

"Raising the supervision age reflects research showing that incidents often occur among children aged 0-14. Our goal is to reduce the risk to potential injuries and drowning in public aquatic facilities," Cr Heslin explained.

In line with the Guidelines for Safe Pool Operations to ensure safe supervision levels, groups / families will not be permitted entry where the number of Parent / Guardian's supervising a group of children under 10 years exceeds the ratio of 1:4. Larger informal groups of children arriving at an aquatic facility may also be required to participate in a short safety briefing to the entry policies and may be refused entry.

"This policy builds on the Watch Around Water policies with a view to reduce the number of youth related behavioural incidents encountered at all Council Outdoor Aquatic Facilities.

"Through implementation of this policy and associated actions staff will have clear age-related guidelines on facility entry for minors and education for large group entries," concluded Cr Heslin. Council encourages all parents, guardians, and community groups to familiarise themselves with the new policy ahead of the upcoming pool season.

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A PAGE TO SHARE RECIPES

Delicious & Simple Savoury Mince

Prep Time 10 mins Cook 40 mins Serves 4

INGREDIENTS

1 tbsp olive oil

1 brown onion, finely chopped

500 grams beef mince

2 tbsp instant beef gravy powder

1 cup tomato puree

1 cup cold water

400g red royale potatoes, peeled, diced

300g carrots, peeled, diced

200g button mushrooms, quartered 150g (1 cup) of frozen peas and corn

Steamed white rice, to serve

Step 1

Heat oil in a saucepan over medium-high heat. Add onion and mince. Cook, stirring with a wooden spoon to break up mince, for 6 to 8 minutes or until browned. Add gravy powder, tomato puree and cold water. Stir to combine. Step 2

Add potato and carrot. Season with salt and pepper. Cover. Bring to the boil. Reduce heat to medium-low. Simmer, stirring occasionally, for 20 minutes or until potato is just tender. Add mushrooms and pea mixture.

Cook for 5 minutes or until heated through. Serve with rice.



Healthier chocolate cookies

10 dates, pitted, finely chopped 60ml (1/4 cup) boiling water

90g (1 cup) rolled oats

400g can Coles Chickpeas, drained, rinsed 1 tsp baking powder

45g (1/2 cup) desiccated coconut

75g (1/3 cup) solidified

coconut oil, melted, cooled

2 tbsp cocoa powder, plus extra to flatten

1 egg

1 tsp vanilla extract

Step 1— Preheat oven to 180C/160C fan forced and line 2 baking trays with baking paper. Place the dates in a heatproof bowl and cover with water. Set aside for 2 minutes to soften. Use a fork to coarsely mash

Step 2— Process the oats in a food processor and until chopped. Add the dates, chickpeas, coconut, coconut oil, cocoa powder, baking powder, egg and vanilla. Process to combine. Transfer to a bowl and set aside for 30 minutes to allow to thicken.

Step 3— Roll level tablespoons of the mixture into balls and place on the prepared trays. Dip the tines of a fork in cocoa to prevent sticking, and press into each cookie first one way and then the other (biscuits should be 1cm thick). Keep dipping the fork into cocoa as needed. Step 4— Bake cookies for 12 minutes. Cool on the tray for 5 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely. Store in an airtight container for up to 4 days, (biscuits will become

softer).

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
