Penshurst Community Plan 2019-2021



What is a community plan & why do we need one?

A community plan will provide Penshurst with a focus on key future directions and a common reference when working with all levels of government. A plan provides a community with a strong voice and strengthens connections and communication across the general community. The plan outlines a vision, short to medium and long-term goals, with solutions that will assist the future development of the town. It has a 'whole of community' focus and identifies partnerships which help achieve action.

Our Vision - Penshurst will:

- be a resilient, diverse and thriving town with a strong sense of community
- be a safe and attractive place to live
- be a desirable tourist destination
- have a strong supporting infrastructure with quality services and facilities
- service a range of existing industries and encourage new commercial activities

Our Location

Located at the junction of four major highways within the Southern Grampians Local Government area of Victoria, Penshurst is a historically significant rural township that lies within an internationally unique volcanic landscape. The township of Penshurst is set at the foot of the dormant volcano, Mount Rouse.

Agriculture has been the long-standing backbone of the community's economy since Penshurst was first founded in the mid 1800's and highly productive agricultural lands and food and fibre production enterprises continue to surround and support the township.

Sitting on the main tourist route between the Great Ocean Road and the Grampians National Park, Penshurst is an important tourist destination, located closely to other well-recognised tourist centres such as Dunkeld (30km), Port Fairy (64km) and Halls Gap (94km); and within close proximity to a number of larger regional centres including Hamilton (32km), Warrnambool (70km), Ararat (106km), Portland (107km), Colac (147km), Mount Gambier (157km) and Horsham (160km), Penshurst offers many opportunities as a place to

do business and is an ideally located central meeting place for the business community. Geelong (205km) and Melbourne (276km) are also each located within an easy commute.

Our People

In the 2016 Census, the Penshurst district had a total population of 624 people. (https://quickstats.censusdata.abs.gov.au/census_services/getproduct/census/2016/quickst at/SSC22044?opendocument).

The median age of residents living within the Penshurst township in 2016 was 52 years and the age structure of the town population was as follows:

Our History

Mt Rouse or Kolor is a key landmark for the Djab Wurrung Aboriginal people and the Mount marks their traditional language boundary (Clark, 1995) that included Mount William Range, Gariwerd to the Pyrenees Ranges in the east, and the headwaters of the Hopkins River flowing south. Within the Djab Wurrung people the Kolor Gundidj clan occupied the land around the Mount and took their name from Kolor which meant lava and lava stone that was used to rub ochre (Dawson, 1881) (Mount Rouse Reserve Management Plan, 2016-2021).

In 1839, John Cox became the first squatter to take up land around the Penshurst area. Thereafter two pioneer families farmed on and around Mount Rouse. John and Daniel Twomey leased the Kolor run in 1852 and later bought the freehold. David Hutton leased the Purdeet run then purchased the leasehold (later renamed Cheviot Hills, after the region in southern Scotland) in 1851.

The Western District of the Port Phillip Aboriginal Protectorate operated from 1839 until 1849 and the central station, located at Mount Rouse, commenced in 1842. The Protectorate failed after ten years and from about 1852 the township of Penshurst began to develop centred on the remaining government buildings. Bluestone, from Mount Rouse, can be found in the State Parliament and Treasury buildings in Spring Street, Melbourne. Mosaic and stained glass works of art, created by Mervyn Napier Waller who was raised in the area can be seen at the Hall of Memory at the Australia War Memorial in Canberra.

Our Landscape and Assets

The Penshurst District boasts many important landscape features and natural assets. The **Mount Rouse Reserve** overlays the area of land surrounding the summit and crater of Mount Rouse, an extinct volcano adjacent to the Penshurst township. As a distinctive volcanic formation with geological features that are unique internationally, Mount Rouse is the volcanic eruption point of ancient lava flows which extend more than 60 kilometres to the coast at Port Fairy. Mount Rouse offers 360-degree scenic views, picnic areas, volcanic crater and walking tracks.

Penshurst is located on the third largest **volcanic plain** on earth and the **Volcanoes Discovery Centre** located in the heart of Penshurst provides a fascinating and interactive visitor experience that explains the volcanic history of Western Victoria. The Centre also provides interesting insights into how volcanoes are formed, volcanic rock formations and lava flows.

Yatmerone Wildlife Reserve is a local sanctuary for birds, wildlife and is home to the critically endangered Western Swamp Crayfish. Actively maintained by a group of committed local volunteers, Yatmerone offers a walking track and bird hide and provides a great visitor experience.

The **Botanic Gardens & 'Never Fail Spring'** are hidden gems in the heart of Penshurst. The spring is a continuous water resource fed by the aquifers beneath Penshurst and flows into wetland gardens that offer a great spot for a picnic and a walk. The Botanic Gardens are filled with towering trees and expanses of lawn area, and includes a barbeque shelter, playground, caravan park and amenities and provides a great location for visitor stop overs and for community events.

About our Plan

Purpose

This plan outlines priorities for the Penshurst Community covering the two-and-a-half-year period from July 2019 to December 2021. The plan is ambitious and is intended to guide actions and activities that can be undertaken by the Penshurst community and the groups within it to grow and enhance Penshurst, its people and its assets. It is recognised that not all actions included within the plan can be achieved within a two+-year time frame, however, the plan acts as a ledger of community priorities so that they are not lost. These priorities can be continually amended in future plans as community interests and priorities change.

The plan will also act as an important reference document for the Penshurst Progress Association, when seeking funding and support for projects and initiatives from the Southern Grampians Shire Council, State and Federal Government departments and other funders.

How the Plan was Developed

The Penshurst community plan has been developed by the Penshurst Progress Association through a consultation process with the Community that included:

- A Community Planning Session held in March 2019 to review the 2016 Penshurst Community Plan and to workshop future inclusions.
- Drafting of the 2019 2021 Penshurst Community Plan
- Circulation of the Draft Plan for comment to the Penshurst Progress Association Members in May 2019
- Provision of opportunities for the broader community to comment on the Draft Plan in June 2019.
- Finalisation of the Plan in June 2019.
- Endorsement of the Plan by the Penshurst Progress Association in June 2019.

Implementation

The Penshurst Progress Association will take the lead on implementing this plan and will seek the support and contribution of the Penshurst community and the groups within it to achieve the goals that have been set.

The plan will be implemented from July 2019 and will finalise in December 2021.

In December of each year the Penshurst Progress Association will use the action plan template included at the back of this document, to identify a set of realistic and achievable actions that can be taken forward from this plan and implemented in the upcoming year.

Reviewing the Plan

A review of this plan and the inclusions within it should be led by the Penshurst Progress Association no later than June 2020 so that new plan can be developed to commence in January 2021. The Penshurst Progress Association and the Penshurst community may wish to review the plan earlier should it lose relevance or require updating.
